She said her daughter is imProving in Milton District Hospital following more than two hours of surgery to remove two bullets, and is in good spirits despite being in considerable pain.

"It has been a very traumatic experience for her," said Mrs. Flemington.

She and her husband Ed are caring for their daughter's two children Shauna, two years, and Daryl, four-and-a-half months, at their rural Milton

"Her children are her first Priority. She is always asking about them." Mrs. Flemington said she felt her daughter's strength will get her through the horrible ordeal.

"But it is going to be a long haul." "Her elbow has been severely damaged and she may never regain the use of it again. The doctors are not promising anything," she said.

"It is hard but I know I have to feel grateful it was not worse."

A bullet missed Patti's spine by a mere quarter of an inch. Had it struck her spine, it would have meant almost certain complete paralyzation, said her mother.

"It could have been worse."
