In an information report presented to members of the health and social services committee recently, Halton medical officer of health Dr. Peter Cole outlined some of the terms of Assistive Devices Program recently unveiled by Ontario health minister Dennis Timbrell.

Dr. Cole said the program was designed to assist with up to 75 per cent of the cost of artificial limbs, wheelchairs, hearing aids and other devices for children aged 18 and under.

Oakville Coun. Fred Oliver said he was "surprised that the program was meant for child-

ren an '-et would apply to any up to age 18.

Regional council has passed a bylaw prohibiting residents from putting newsprint in their garbage, but a slump in the market for recycled paper has caused some concern about the program.

Halton Hills councillors had asked the Region to delay the implementation of the bylaw until the area municipalities had time to develop the programs that will be required to separate

newsprint from garbage. Aside from offering whatever help they can, committee decided the April 1 starting date for the new bylaw should stick.

# He found the prints

A 34-year-old Halton police constable, who recently won two commendations from the Crown attorney's office, has been chosen Police Officer of the Months.

While testifying at a recent murder and robbery trial at the Supreme Court in Hamilton Constable McWhirter helped to prove that two of the three suspects were at the scene of the crime.



The case involved a woman who was pistolwhipped in underground garage. Constable McWhirter used the gun butt, which had broken off during the incident, to identify the suspect's fingerprints. The gun butt was later matched to a gun found in the possession

of the accused, while

footwear impressions were linked to a second. McWHIRTER McWhirter also raised fingerprints on cheques cashed, using identification that was stolen during the robbery.

Following the trial, a seasoned crown attorney told Halton police Sgt. A. McQueen that Constable McWhirter's preparation of court materials and ex-

hibits filed at the murder trial where among the best he'd ever seen prepared.

Constable McWhirter received his second commendation not long after during his investigation of a fatal accident. Constable McWhirter capped his efforts by making seven identifications at various crime scenes throughout the region, bringing his 1981 identifications to a total of 34.

Constable McWhirter started his police career in 1968 and has since worked uniform patrols, radar enforcement, motorcycle patrol, as a breathalyzer officer and in the criminal investigations bureau.

Since September 1979, Constable McWhirter has worked full time in the identification bureau. His duties include the investigation of crime scenes and articiles associated with crime for evidence, as well as the preparation of plan drawings and charts for the use in courts.

Prior to his assignment as an identification officer, Constable McWhirter took an intensive 12-work course at the Ontario Police College. Now he and five fellow identification officers investigate approximately 350 criminal cases per year.
