calcium and protein content. The correct methods of measuring the ingredients, starting the yeast, kneading the dough, letting it rise until double in size, punching it down, letting it rest 10 minutes and finally putting in the pans letting rise again and baking for a total time of 240 minutes were given.

The final results were delicious rolls and a loaf of bread. The members also prepared a loaf of batter bread and this with the rolls were served with jam and tea for lunch and were enjoyed by all.

A booklet prepared by Christie Bread entitled "History of Bread through the ages" was read. This story tells of cavemen eating grasses and seeds, later grinding the wheat kernels between stones and making a flat hard bread that was cooked on ashes.

Egyptians were the first people to add yeast to the flour and make a leavened bread, and a new way of cooking had to be invented and the first ovens were large jars, preheated on an open fire. The early peo-

ple were fighters but poor farmers and so there was a shortage of grain, the poor starved but the kings had plenty and herds of hungry paupers waited to be given crumbs from the royal table. Corn was the original grain to make bread but later wheat was used and to satisfy the European need for bread Canada and USA turned thousands of miles of country into wheat farms. This necessitated the building

of great railroads to take the precious food to the sea ports. The great business boom in wheat & bread helped develop the western provinces in

Canada and cities to be places of great importance.

The making of bread has come along way with modern methods of harvesting of grain. Science has given us huge mills which can do the work of a thousand slaves, and a finer, cleaner product is ours to enjoy. There is a long history behind the making of a loaf of bread from prehistoric times until now.

Human hands never touch bread in a modern bakery, everything is automatically controlled. After making bread and rolls in our own kitchens there is a great sense of pride and satisfaction in being able to serve our families luscious home made bread. Try it.
