lection action has stopped, chief administrative officer Dennis Perlin said. Members of the administration and finance committee had first recommended that the confidential stamp be removed from the list, but since that time several concerns raised by Regional staff convinced them to drop the cur-

tain back into place.

Regional councillors recently gave their approval to a contract with Trans-Video Inspection Ltd., to rent closed circuit equipment at a cost of \$358 per unit per day.

The equipment will be used to carry out maintenance inspections of sever mains.


