up a pair of fourths on vault and beam. At the Tyro B level, Brenda Marshall was second on beam, fourth on floor and sixth on bars.


In novice, Marissa Long claimed the top spot and the gold medal with three firsts on beam, floor and vault plus a second on bars.

Cameron was first on vault, second on floor and


