Last chance to register

Milton Youth Soccer Club's first registration a couple of weeks ago resulted in about the expected number of players signing up. As usual the numbers are higher in the younger age groups.

The older players are always later signing up and this poses a particular problem for the club executive. Due to the smaller numbers of players registering for the pee-wee and bantam age groups MYSC is attempting to again join forces with Georgetown, Pineview and Hillsburgh to form a viable recreational league. However, due to the slow registration in these age plans are not progressing very quickly.

MYSC will be holding a second registration at Milton Mall Friday, March 19 and Saturday, March 20. This will be the last opportunity to register at the regular fee. After that date a late registration fee will apply.

MYSC registrar Nick McMaster is a little concerned some potential players might miss the March 19/20 registration as it falls into the March Break. If you have not already registered and are going to be away on the March Break, you should call Nick at 878-2942. However, please do not call if you can get to the mall of March 19/20—the registrar gets quite enough phone calls as it is.

Pineview Youth Soccer Club will be operating in 1982 under virtually the same management. Many of the executive, including the president Martin Boettcher, had declined to run for office this year but when nobody came forward Martin agreed to continue "for one more year".

Pineview YSC had their expected turn-out at registration. Martin tells me that they usually get about two-thirds of their players at registration and the remainder drift in later.

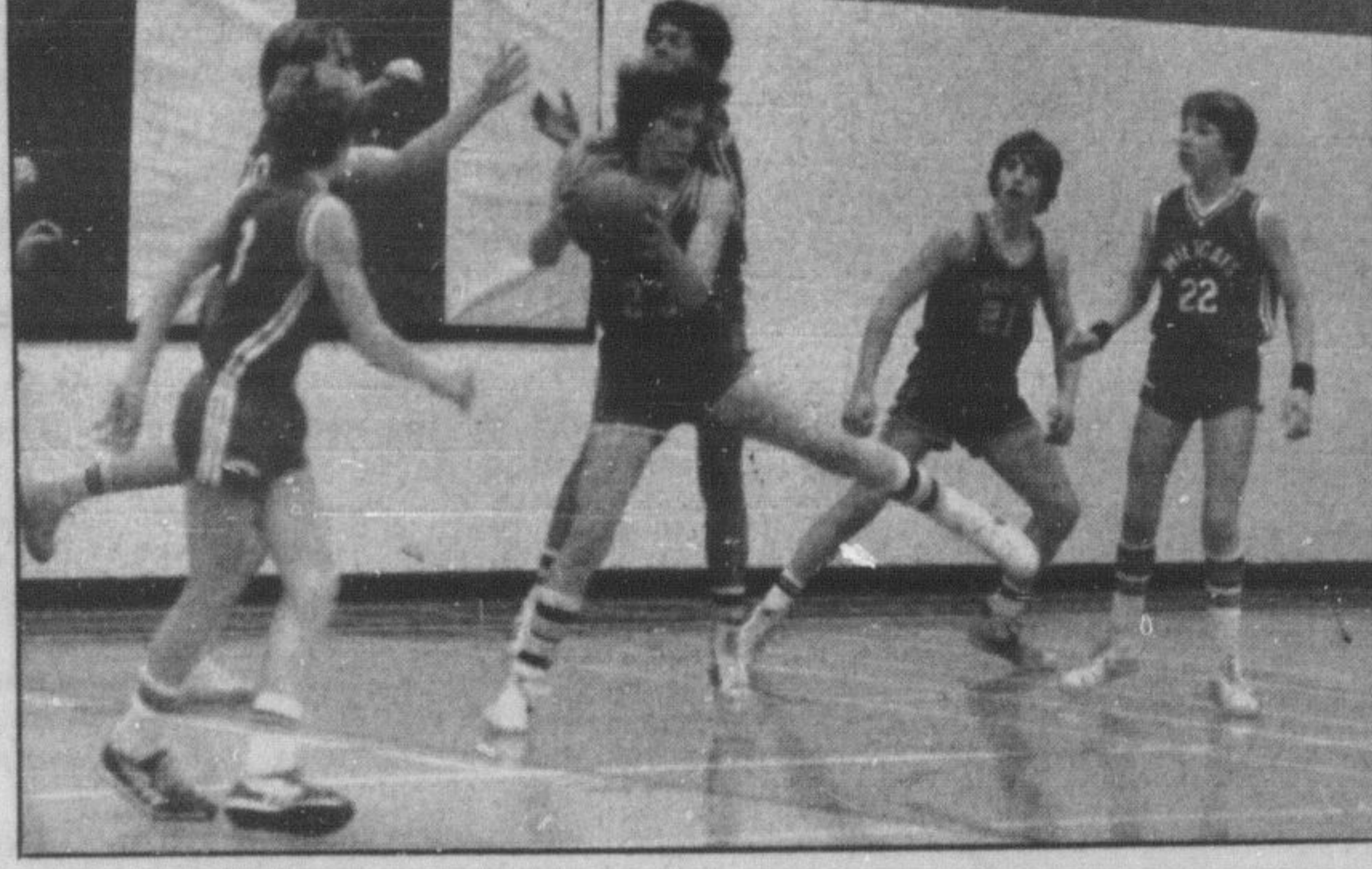
