All hopes for a title rest with Optimists minor peewees


Hopes for a Milton OMHA crown have been reduced to Optimists minor peewees as three rep hockey teams were eliminated in quarter-final action in a span of four days.



Blades valiant comeback effort fails short in series' sixth game

Going to the absolute limit, Milton Banvil Blades minor bantams took Fort Erie to six games in a five game series before bowing out 7-4 Sunday at Memorial Arena.

Blades saved themselves from elimination with a well engineered 5 2 win Wednesday night at Memorial Arena to square the series at two games apiece and then forced a sixth game after a 2-2 overtime draw Saturday at Fort Erie.

The victory for Fort Erie gave the border town the rubber match in their three-year rivalry. Two years ago, as minor peewees, Milton defeated Fort Erie 3-1 for the OMHA championship. Last year as major bantams, Fort Erie gained revenge by knocking out Milton in the quarter-finals in five games.
