

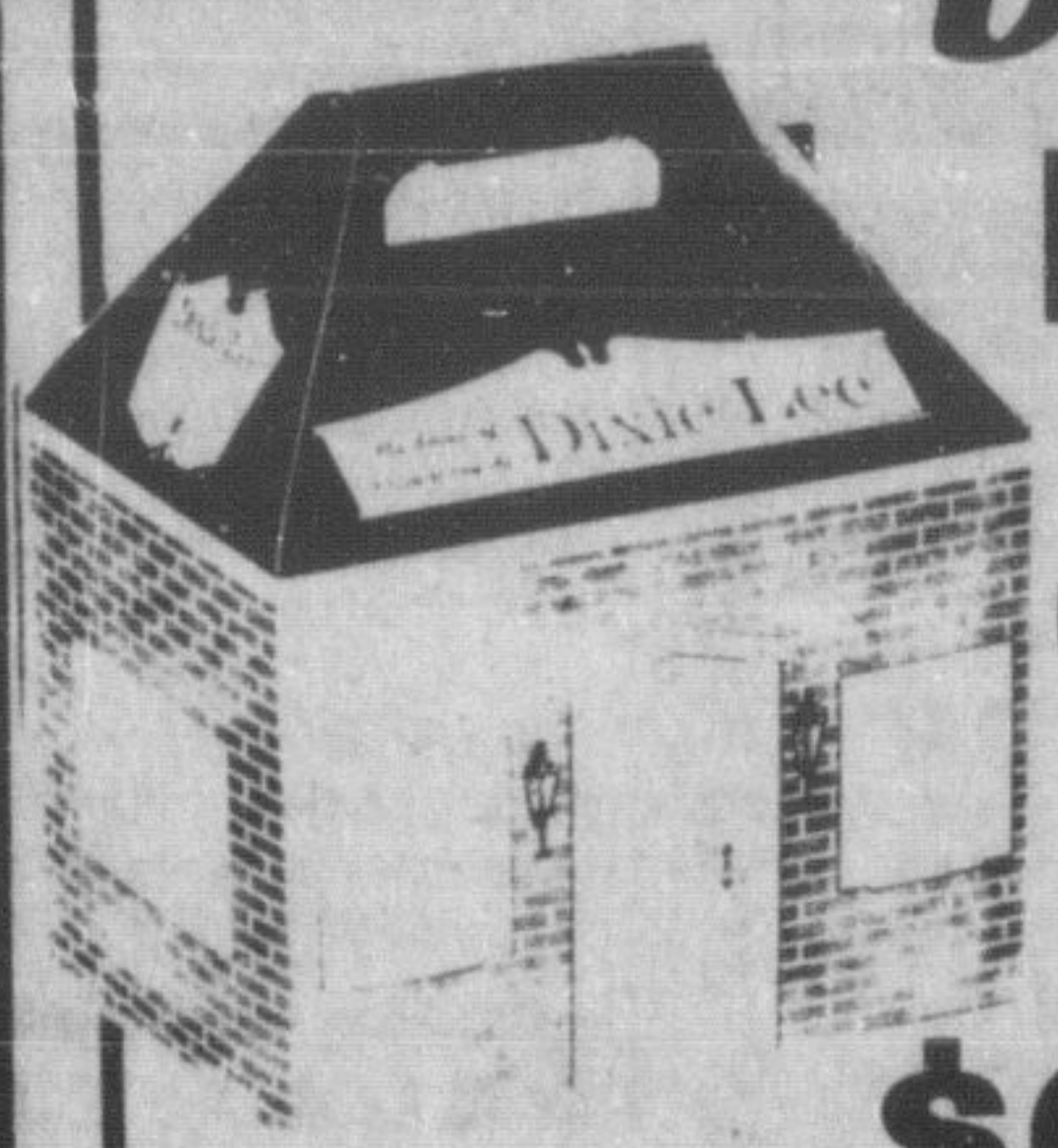

Brookville

Rural school tops others in science fair

Everything from the effect of colored lights on pea plants to testing the puncture resistance of garbage bags helped Brookville Public School students to fare well at a recent science fair at E.C. Drury High School.

A total of 50 students, representing Brookville, W.I. Dick, McKenzie Smith, Acton, Sam Sherratt, E.C. Drury High School and its sister school for the hearing handicapped, entered exhibits in this second annual science fair. It was organized by Dave Wright, head of the E.C. Drury's science department.

The organizer explained the competitive display will be "beefed up" next year as Grade 9 science students will be required to enter projects as a compulsory part of their course.

Young scientists, ranging from Grade 6 to the junior high school level, entered the competition with Brookville Grade 7 and 8 students taking the top three prizes in their respective age groups.

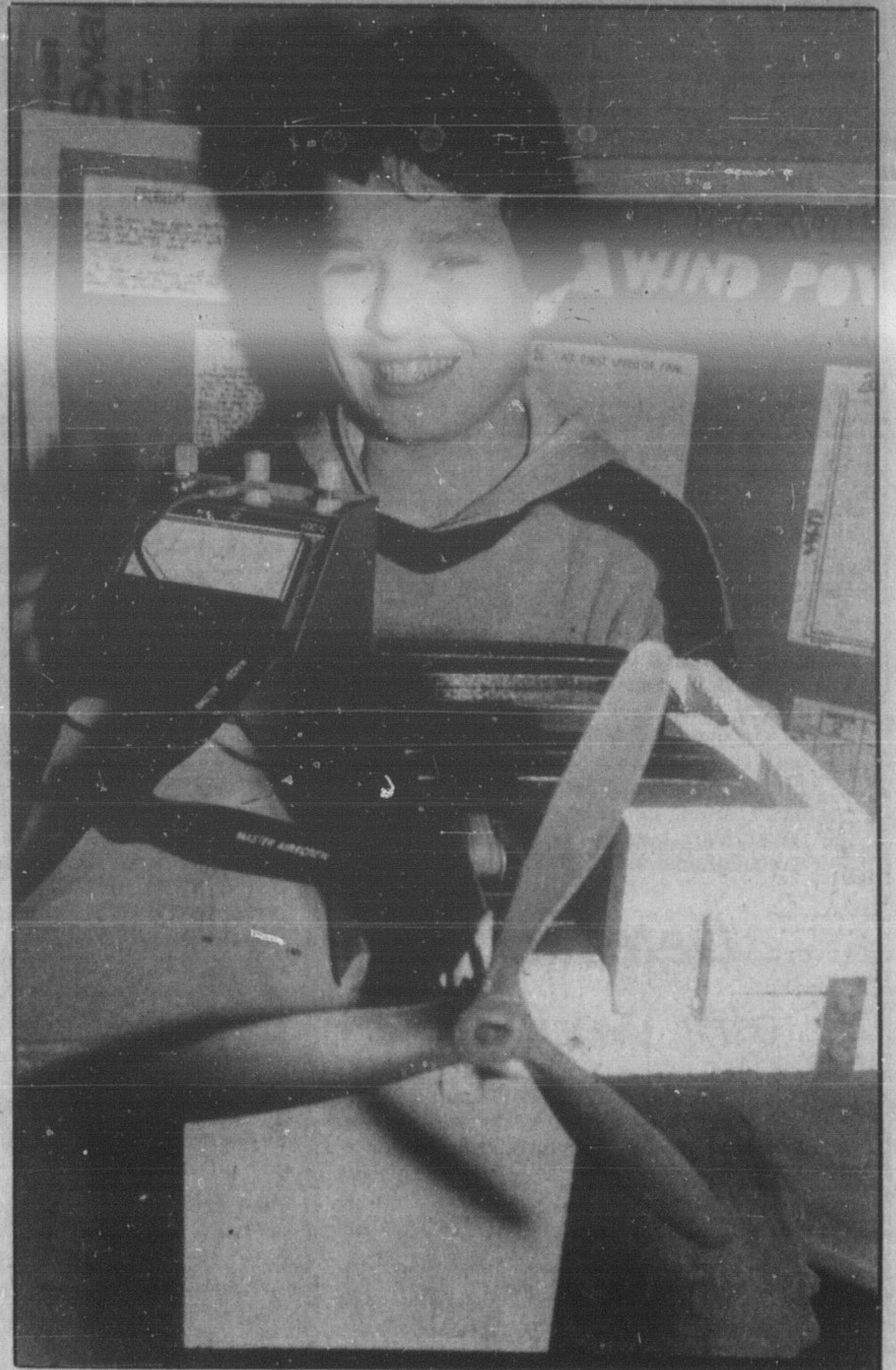
Susie Dix, Andrea Hardy, Sandi Snyder earned first, second and third prizes in the Grade 7 division respectively with first, second and third prizes going to Craig Dick, Michelle Pierce and Glenn Sproule, Grade 8 students, in that order.

These winning displays were included in a science fair at Brookville school last week.

First phase

Cable welcomes pay TV

James Magee of Halton Cable Systems has been waiting since 1976 for the Canadian Radio-television Telecommunications Commission's decision last

week to license a national pay TV system.

A total of six networks, including two national and four regional services were granted licenses by the CRTC Thursday. Both national and one regional pay TV package will be considered by the local cable company—to be made available to local subscribers within a year.

"The ball is now in their court," said Mr. Magee of the networks. "We're waiting for them." He said Halton Cable systems is likely to buy into all three, but it will be up to the individual subscriber which service will be purchased at the consumer level.

First Choice Communications Corp. of Toronto will establish the national network to operate 24 hours a day offering first run movies, sports specials and sports events. This company will provide two nation-wide channels, one in French and one in English.

The second national pay TV network, Toronto's Lively Arts Market Builders Inc. will offer 42 hours a week of cultural programs. Halton Cable Systems will likely consider the Ontario-based independent network which offers 50 hours a week of programming.

Based on the experience in the United States, Mr. Magee predicts from 30 to 50 per cent of Halton residents will subscribe to one pay TV channel. He anticipates a charge of about \$15 for the 24-hour-a-day service with the other two services costing somewhat less.

"These people (licensed networks) are having to put a lot of money up front, somewhere in the millions of dollars," Mr. Magee said.

The high cost of getting the ball rolling is one reason he feels steps to get the service to the consumer will move quickly in order to begin taking in capital. Mr. Magee expects to hear from the various networks offering pay TV packages in a month's time.

The CRTC stipulated the licensed networks must have their services in line no sooner than Dec. 1, 1982 and no later than April 1, 1983.

The major network, First Choice, has promised, in its first four years of operation to turn more than \$3 million over to Canadian productions.

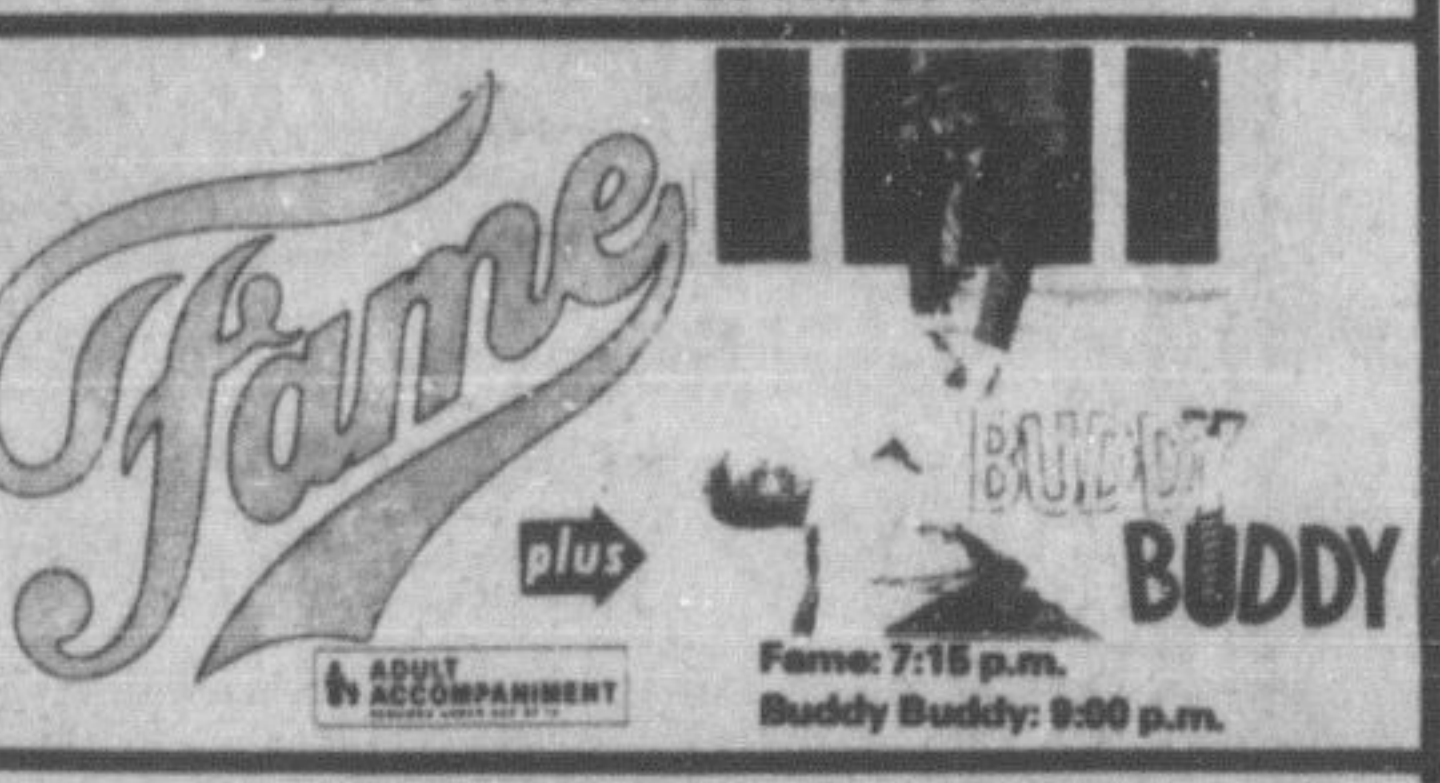
