## Gun and cash stolen

A .22 calibre revolver and \$100 cash were stolen from a Milton home during daylight hours, Halton Regional Police report.

Police said the thief took the two items from a residence on 605 Foster Cres. but that there was no indication of forced entry.

## Firecrackers stolen

Two Milton teenagers will appear in Milton provincial court next month to face charges of break, enter and theft in connection with a break-in at Hand Chemical Mar. 1.

Liam Flynn 17, of 551 Commercial St. Unit 23 and Stephen Mead 16, of 246 Boland Cres., Campbellville are jointly charged with break, enter, theft and possession of stolen goods.

An estimated \$200 worth of firecrackers were stolen from the local plant on Nipissing Rd.

The pair are scheduled to appear in court Monday, Apr. 5.

## Impaired driver leads to stolen car

The arrest of an impaired man Friday evening in the parking lot of Fifth Wheel Truck Stop led Halton Regional Police to the discovery of a car reported stolen earlier that evening.

Plainclothes officers were leaving the popular trucker's stop on Chisholm Dr. when they spotted a suspicious party, said police.

They subsequently charged 26-year-old Joseph Harry Hatfield of Toronto with impaired care and control of the vehicle.

Further questioning of the other two occupants resulted in a charge of possession of a stolen vehicle against Anderson Lilly 26, also of Toronto.

The car, a 1980 Oldsmobile, was reported stolen from a Dominion Food Store on Royal York Rd. earlier.

## Youth charged with mischief

An 18-year-old Milton youth has been charged with mischief in connection with the smashing of a store front window and door on Main St. over the weekend.

Eugene Honeywell, of 316 Pearl St., will appear in Milton provincial court Monday Apr. 19 on a charge of mischief.

Halton Regional Police said a large plate glass window at Harris Stationary, 182 Main St., and a glass front door at West End Meat Market, 140 Main St., were broken early Saturday morning.

## Daylight B&E

Halton Regional Police are investigating a break and enter that occurred during daylight hours last Wednesday.

Police said the home of Jenning Duench of 741 Laurier Ave. was entered via an inside door in the house garage.

Approximately \$2,000 worth of jewelry and \$220 cash were stolen.

## Youth charged with assault

A 16-year-old Milton youth has been charged with assault causing bodily harm, following an altercation with the owner of The Arcade, a pinball machine arcade in Milton Mall Monday.

Brad General of no fixed address has been charged by Halton Regional Police.

Police said Luigi Croce, owner-manager of the arcade suffered injuries to the left eye, as a result of being punched. He was treated at Milton District Hospital and later released.

Mr. General has also been charged with two separate offences under the liquor licence act.

A court date has not yet been set.

# Cop charged, cars dinged in rural high speed chase

A high speed police chase through rural Milton Saturday night, which ended in the crash of two police cruisers and a third car, has resulted in charges against a Halton Regional Police officer.

Charged with following too close is 29-year-old Greg Braun, a first class constable with the Milton station.

The charge against the local officer follows an internal police investigation into the incident by Burlington Sgt. Norm Ryall.

Halton Regional Police have also charged 31-year-old Robert Lajeunesse of Unit 63, Commercial St., Milton with dangerous driving.

Police said the incident began at approximately 10:20 p.m. when Constable Ray Hendry of Milton attempted to pull over a suspect in a Mercury car travelling westbound on Britannia Rd.

The car sped off and Constable Hendry took pursuit.

He was later joined by constables Braun and Dave Hamer.

Police said the chase followed a route along Fifth Line, Derry Rd., Trafalgar Rd., Britannia Rd., and back to Fifth Line, reaching speeds of up to 110 km per hour.

The posted rate along these roads varies from 50 to 80 km per hour.

Police said the accused went through a red light and several stop signs.

According to police officials, Constable Hendry pulled in front of Mr. Lajeunesse at one point, in an effort to stop the car, and came into collision with him.

Constable Braun, travelling behind both cars, then came into collision with Mr. Lajeunesse.

Damage to Constable Braun's cruiser is estimated at \$3,000.

Damage to the other cruiser driven by Constable Hendry is estimated at \$150. Damage is estimated at \$1,000 to the Mercury driven by the accused.

Constable Braun suffered minor injuries as a result of the accident and is off work.

An official news release issued from police headquarters over the weekend said the accused car "collided" with two police vehicles.

## Campaign kick-off

With their goal set at \$700,000, Halton region Conservation Foundation plans to kick off their official six-week fundraising campaign Sunday, May 2.

The money is to be used towards the restoration of a 1500 A.D. Indian village at the site of Crawford Lake and the construction of an interpretative centre.

The large group of private individuals, business people and conservation enthusiasts hope to secure the necessary funds during this six-week campaign drive. The funds will be payable over a three-year period.

Both major and small businesses, banks and the private sector will be approached to help with the restoration project.

Only in recent years has the significance of the area become known, prompting the formation of the foundation in 1975.

The organization hopes to begin work on the reconstruction of the Indian village in August of this year.

Metroland President John Baxter says no corporate decision was involved in joining the press council. The issue was raised at a meeting of publishers and it was agreed unanimously that each would join individually.

Council chairman J. Allyn Taylor greeted Metroland enthusiastically, saying "this exciting move greatly enhances the prospect of still broader newspaper participation in the press council in the near future."

"I applaud the decisions of these publishers," he added. "Obviously, they felt that their newspapers could serve their readers far more effectively by becoming accountable through the press council for their conduct in the gathering and publication of news, opinion and advertising."

Mr. Taylor added that "the situation is all the more gratifying because the individual decisions were made by community newspaper publishers who develop extremely close relations with the people in the areas they serve."

"We welcome them most warmly and hope, before very long, many other newspapers in the province—whatever the frequency of publication—will follow their example. The door is always open."

The Metroland newspapers that joined include bi-weeklies Aurora Banner (11,000); Burlington Post (70,000); Mississauga News (140,000); Newmarket Era (35,000); Oakville Beaver (50,000) and Oshawa This Week (90,000).

Weeklies include Acton Free Press (4,000); Ajax/Whitby/Pickering News Advertiser (25,500); Brampton Guardian (28,000); Bolton Enterprise (6,850); Etobicoke Advertiser/Guardian (45,000); Georgetown Independent (13,000); Canadian Champion (9,800); North York Mirror (72,000); Richmond Hill Liberal (14,000); Scarborough Mirror (55,000); Stouffville Tribune (7,000); Thornhill/Markham Economist and Sun (17,000) and Woodbridge & Vaughan News (5,150).

The 48 press council member newspapers now comprise 10 dailies, six bi-weeklies, 31 weeklies and one bi-monthly.
