Milton Scouts to plant 6,000 trees

Three million trees will be planted in Canada this year by Scouts participating in the "Trees for Canada" project.

In every province and the Northwest Territories, Scouts will be expressing their concern for their country through planting trees. The results of this project will be a more beautiful Canada, a land which is less susceptible to flooding and a future source of vital raw materials.

"Trees for Canada" is a fundraising project. Most of the funds stay in the community where it is raised. Some goes to Canadian Scouting's international brotherhood program. These funds assist developing and Third World countries in self help programs adapted to local needs and conditions.

The funds are raised through pledges from people in each community involved. In most communities only one contact will be made with a householder. This combined with knowing how many trees the Scout will plant, makes it easy to determine how much to pledge.

After the tree planting in May the boys will return to collect the pledges and each boy will have with him an authorization card for your security.

Crawford Lake. This year it's planned to be at Sixteen Valley Conservation, 5th Line south of Britannia Road.

Recipe Poached eggs

An Easter brunch wouldn't be complete without eggs.

This recipe requires no new cooking techniques, but a variation of an old method. Eggs are poached then laid in a bed of poached lettuce and pastry shells. Julienne vegetables add a dash of color as a tasty garnish.

Poached Eggs "Nouvelle Cuisine"

- 4 eggs
- 4 lettuce leaves
- 4 shortcrust or semi-flaky pastry shells
- 1 cup mixed vegetables (carrots, celery, green onions) cut into julienne strips *
- 1 cup fresh mushrooms, quartered
- 1 shallot
- 1 1/2 cup white butter (see below)
- salt, pepper

* Julienne indicates long thin strips
Poach the 4 lettuce leaves very slightly by soaking them in hot water for approximately one minute.

Saute mushrooms and shallots in butter. Spoon equal amounts in pastry shells. Keep warm in low oven (170 degrees F).

Saute the julienne vegetables in butter until tender-crisp approximately 1 minute.

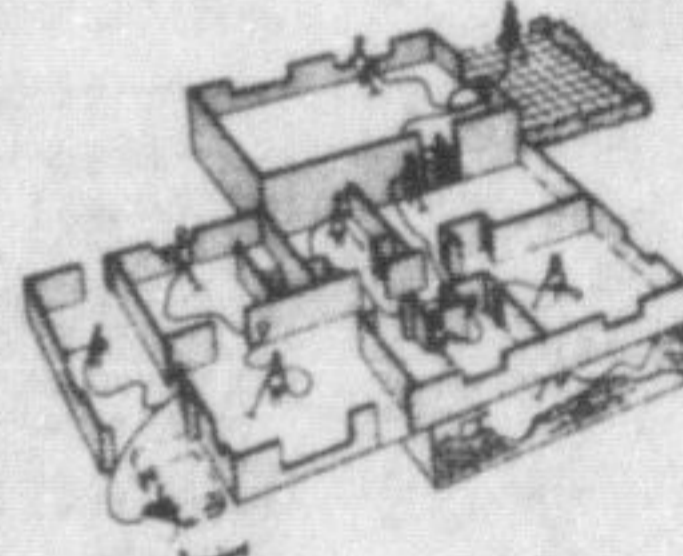
To poach the eggs, simply fill pan with enough water to cover eggs one inch and bring water to just below boil. Break eggs one at a time into saucer or cup, and slip gently into water. Always poach eggs at the simmering point. Boiling liquid will toughen them. Carefully wrap each egg in a lettuce leaf, and place in pastry shell. Cover with a white sauce and garnish with a tablespoon of sauteed julienne vegetables.
