Julian Reed speaks out

The speaker at our meeting on Thursday evening, April 1, was Mr. Julian Reed, our Member of Provincial Parliament.

Julian has just been appointed natural resources critic for the Liberal opposition — he was formerly the energy critic. He spoke about "Politics and Pollution", a topic much suited to his interests. Julian pointed out that the province faces severe problems as a result of pollution, and he feels that acid rain is the most serious problem we face now and in the future. Pollution problems have arisen due to a lack of foresight, for example the P B and dioxin problem, and also simply as a result of consumer demand.

People want comforts, and must realize that there may be an environmental price. Pollution is a complex problem to resolve as so many facets of society are affected, and ultimately there must be a balance to suit as many interests as possible.

As Julian pointed out, we may have to adjust our lifestyles in order to prevent damage to the environment and to preserve it for future generations. The

last few years have proved that we can adjust, when one considers the response of North Americans to the oil crisis.

Conservation does not have to lead to a loss of jobs, as new industries may be created in response. How do we individuals influence our politicians in the fight against pollution?

MDHS students win big in math

Milton District High School finished in the top percentile in the Canadian Mathematics Competition sponsored by the University of Waterloo.

The Pascal and Fermat contests attracted some 3,500 students.

This year MDHS ranked in the top 16 per cent in Canada and top 17 per cent in Ontario in the Pascal contest for Grade 9 students. The school placed fourth among Halton schools and 11th among schools in Halton and Peel—of which there are 40.

In the Fermat contest for Grades 10 and 11, MDHS ranked in the top 23 per cent in Canada and the upper 26 per cent in Ontario. The school placed sixth in Halton and 14th in Halton and Peel schools.

Medals were presented to Grade 9 school champion Roland Knight and Grade 10 and 11 champion Mike Stewart. Mr. Knight and Mr. Stewart ranked in the 95th and 96th percentiles respectively in Canada.

Team certificates were awarded to Mr. Knight, Judy Graham and Lisa Walker for the Pascal and to Mike Stewart, Joe Seminatore and Lynn

Shire for the Fermat.

Mr. Knight, Miss Graham, Miss Walker, Randy Carman, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Seminatore and Miss Shire received certificates of distinction from the University of Waterloo for scoring in the top 10 per cent in the contest.

Elaine Eirich, Greg Drew, Steven Oldford, Tom Nash, Eugene Cipparone, and Kevin Foley received certificates of merit from the University of Waterloo for finishing in the top 25 per cent.

"We are extremely proud of our results this year for our 44 contestants," says Dean Murray, associate head of mathematics at MDHS.

"We plan to continue our hard work to encourage students to strive for excellence. I believe our success is attributed to our excellent mathematics teachers and coaches, to our feeder schools who are involved in the Gauss Mathematics Contest sponsored by us and, most importantly, to the parents who motivate their children. We look forward to continued success."
