the Tri-County championship with a fine effort. Events such as these sometimes lead one to believe in the "new" minor hockey slogan-"Don't take your kid to the arena, Send him.'

Your kid got a rough going. Your ice time wasn't enough. Whatever, instead of sitting back and complaining, show up to the annual general meeting




