Wayne Hammett, Jones' second, drew to the 12 foot on the center line. Kay Mezei took this out and rolled to cover on the 12 foot. Hammett drew to the 12 foot on center again. Kay got a nose hit to sit just short of the house to the right of center.

On her first shot, Peggy Treahy tried for a hit on Hearn's shot on the open side but blew by, leaving a short tap raise for Jo McDuffe on this same rock. Peggy then repeated her first shot, whereby Jo again drew down to the twelve foot. At this point, Moore has five on the rings, and one just in front, and Jones is starting to get a touch nervous.

Jones' first shot, heading for four foot cover on the right side, pulled up on the eight foot and wide open. Moore came down with a nose hit and oops, there's now six in and nowhere to draw. Ken then did a cool raise split on Kay Mezei's rock to sit eight white in front of the tee line. And that, students, is how its done.
