Here in Ontario, a yearly circuit of fishing derbies or tournaments, is beginning to spread across the province. In many cases it seems that you are not supposed to fish for fun, relaxation or food but for glory and cash.

Can you imagine what would happen to our wildlife population if big cash awards were offered for the largest deer, moose or jack rabbit shot? Poaching would run rampant.

I hope that you do not get from this column that your writer is against fishing derbies. I certainly am not but I think that nice chummy derbies like we have at our club, the kids fishing derby, the annual wild game and awards night held each January at the club house would be kind of dull if it weren't for our fishing and game derbies is much more fun than hiring a guide and expensive fishing tackle just for the glory of catching a big fish. Good natural competition is the spice of life.

There is, however, one good thing about big fish contests. They have given fishing the wide publicity it deserves. Fishing in Ontario bolster the economy far more than most people realize. Anglers spent \$600 million in Ontario alone last year, again I say sportsmen pay their way.

I guess what I am trying to say is commercial derbies are alien to the art of angling. The big derby contestant is pitting himself against other men, not the fish. No longer does the fisherman enjoy the fishing finesse, enjoy a relaxed wait, or look forward to an unexpected big strike. We think this is being overshadowed by the desire to catch a big fish.

No one buys the news pages if I have anything to do with it.


