J-K program squelched

Hopes for a junior kindergarten program for Halton's separate schools this September were squelched Tuesday night and a disappointed parent spokesperson accused some trustees of ignoring the opinions of the voters they represent.

Corrie Gicante, an Oakville mother who spearheaded the campaign for a junior kindergarten, said, "I'm really disappointed. I have felt all along the trustees thought this was a housewives' issue

The Halton Roman Catholic Separate School

Board's finance committee voted 10 to 4 to wipe the junior kindergarten program from the 1982 budget. Mrs. Gicante said she hoped in the upcoming November municipal elections voters would look for fairer representation.

"One thing this has done is to educate ourselves about our trustees. No matter how many phone calls and letters some of them receive, they vote to a large extent based on their own opinion," Mrs. Gicante added.

Although disappointment was high among the parents trying to get junior kindergarten, Mrs. Gicante said the issue is far from being dead.

Oakville trustee Alice Le May, who supported the junior kindergarten programs, said if the issue resurfaced next year, she would back it again.

"I am disappointed in the whole thing. I think the tax payers put forward a sound motion for a good program and I can't honestly understand some of the reasons trustees presented for opposing the idea," Mrs. Le May explained.

The junior kindergarten program was defeated last year, but Mrs. Le May explained it was introduced later in the year and would have affected the budget to a greater extent than this year's proposal which was initiated in February.

Trustees Tony Dutra and Father James Mihm, both representing Oakville, voted against the junior kindergarten program.

"I feel the money (about \$500,000) needed for junior kindergarten could be used to improve existing programs and facilities," said Mr. Dutra.
