
Tennis teams split in league openers

Fish and with ARN COULSON

Some rules for releasing fish

ISHING SEASON in Halton opened on a so-so effort by local fishermen. The stocked ponds were well fished and most fishermen got some nice fish.

Some fishermen who travelled too far north found some lakes weren't yet ice-free and the streams were rather murky. Ruby's fishing contest came off without a hitch but I have no report of the winners at this time.

With pickerel season opening in just a few days, we are sure there are fishermen who will catch under-sized fish they wish to return to the water. Here are a few simple rules to help you return fish with little damage to the fish.

1) Time is essential. Land the fish as quickly as possible. Playing a fish to exhaustion diminishes the chance for survival.

2) Handle the fish as little as possible. Direct contact with the skin increases the chance of harming the fish as they have a coating to protect them from parasites.

3) Wet your hands before handling the fish. If possible, remove the hook while it is still in the water. Don't touch the vital parts of the fish: the gill areas and the eyes.

4) Needle-nose pliers should be a must in a good tackle box to help release the hook. If your fish is deeply hooked, cut the line and leave the hook. Don't try to tear it out of a fish's mouth.

Most people are still quite concerned about the contaminants in fish and their fitness to eat. We can assure you most fish are fit to eat at least once a week. However, pregnant women should make sure of the fish before any is

Tests of more than 62,000 fish from 1,036 Ontario lakes and rivers show sport fish from most popular angling waters are free from contamination, Ontario Environment Minister Keith Norton announced recently.

Fish from more than 150 new lakes and rivers were analized during the past couple of years. Results show most species and sizes may be eaten safely.


