## Property motion stalled

A motion calling on the provincial Ministry of Correctional Services to take responsibility for property damage caused by escaped inmates has been stalled by Milton councillors.

On Monday night councillors voted to table a resolution calling for that action pending further talks with provincial officials.

Concern over this issue has been running high since the early spring escape by three Maplehurst inmates from a work party in the Moffat area.

During less than three hours of freedom the inmates stole a car and caused a small amount of property damage in the area.

In response to fears raised by residents of the area, Milton councillors approved a resolution calling for increased security on work parties, possibly by borrowing personnel from other Ministries that benefit from the work parties.

A second resolution called on Correctional Services to compensate residents for property damage caused by escapers and it was that one that caused concern for councillors.

"This resolution could cause some problems for the Ministry and in turn cause problems for us," commented Coun. Rose Harrison. "We could lose a lot of free labor in the community because of this."

"If we lose these work programs it would be a major loss," she added.

Maplehurst inmates are used for snow and sidewalk clearing in the town and for providing some services to senior citizens during the winter, all on a volunteer basis.

"I think what we have here is an exaggerated response to an incident," said Coun. Don Knight, adding that there have been only a "minimal" number of escapes from the institution and that not all escapes lead to property damage.

"What we're really asking is for the majority to pay for damage caused by the few. It's discrimination against those whose property isn't damaged," he said.

All homeowners carry insurance on their property, he added, and that is the way they should be compensated for any damages that are caused.

"Most home insurance plans cover this kind of damage and it happens so infrequently that it isn't going to effect their premiums," he added.

being provided.

The children will also have access to all of the facilities of the school, including the gymnasium, general purpose room and library.

"We're really pleased to be going to ECD," Mr. Lenz said. "We know that this is going to cause some problems for them, but I'm sure that having our students there will provide some benefits for both of us."

Mr. Lawson added that the rooms to be used by the Grades 2, 3 and 4 students are at the southern end of the facility, "not over where the high school students area."

Mr. Lenz added that this solution is marginally more expensive to Halton taxpayers than busing would have been because provincial grants would have covered more of the transportation costs than they will the rent to be paid to the school for the deaf.

A public meeting is to be held at the Sherratt School May 31 at 7.30 p.m. to explain the decisions.

**NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS THE ONTARIO WEED CONTROL ACT**

as it applies to persons in possession of land within the Town of Halton Hills,  
Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by June 7, 1982 and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, The Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.

Goatsbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
