## Fitness school comes to Milton

Each year the Georgetown Sports and Fitness School gets bigger and better.  
In their first year the school was being offered only in Georgetown. The second summer marked expansion to Acton and in this the third year the school is opening in Milton.  
The school runs for the three weeks beginning August 3 and offers local youngsters over the age of six an opportunity to learn new sports.  
The camps, which will be run at the local high school, offers skill instruction in various events of the students' choice plus specialization in gymnastics for the girls and wrestling for the boys. In addition, a daily swim will be held at the indoor pools and a trip to the University of Guelph for tennis, squash and badminton is also included.  
The program, set up by local high school teachers Mike McMahon, Bob McKay and Grant Clatworthy are fully supervised with the Halton Hills and Milton Recreation Departments helping out with the programs.  
The first week of the school is \$30 for one child \$55 for two, or \$75 per family while the final two weeks of the program (week one is cut a day short by a holiday) costing \$35 for a single.
