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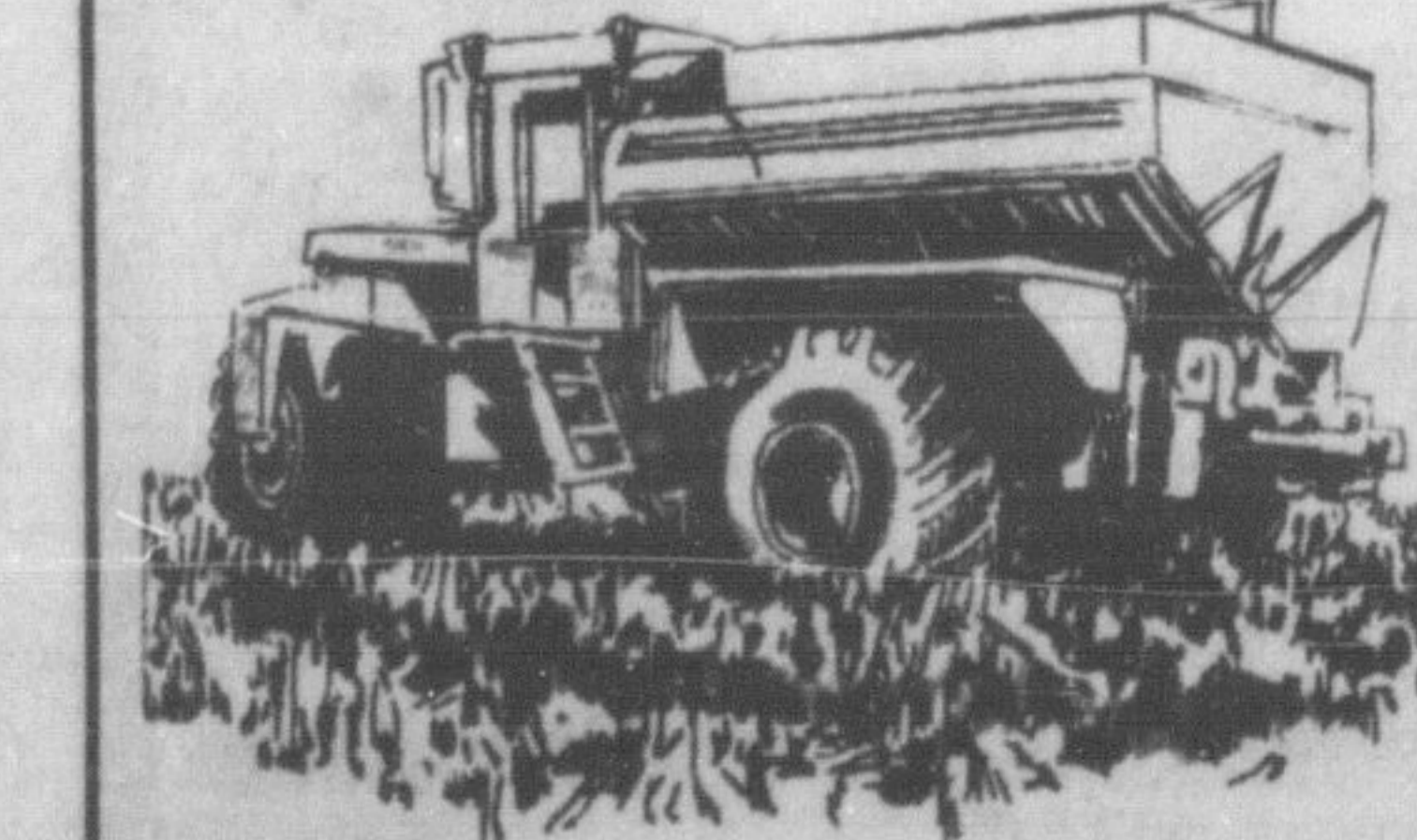
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## Wark's goal gives Dickens win

**golf tips**

**METAL WOODS**

The latest in innovation and technology to come along in recent years is the metal wood, or stainless steel wood to be more precise.

Manufacturers seem to come up with a new wrinkle every year, always searching for the magic golf club that will produce good shots with a bad swing. I think they are getting close.

This type of club will be to woods what investment casting was to irons. They offer the same consistency of weight as investment cast irons and precise boring and face angle. The climate has no effect on this material. Inserts won't pop or chip and the finish won't peel.

These clubs are virtually indestructible. Even better than the low maintenance is the great playability of the club. The low centre of gravity enables the player to get the ball airborne faster, the peripheral weighting of the stainless steel shell, ultimately leads to more solid feel on off-centre hits and no torque on twisting in the neck of the club.

The ball makes a rather odd sound when it meets the steel face but just about everyone I have talked to says it doesn't take long to get used to. Most feel they get much more distance.

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
