Glen Abbey open to everyone

It's been close to a year since Jack Nicklaus, designer of Oakville's Glen Abbey golf course, blasted the management for poor playing conditions during the Canadian Open but according to Director of Golf Al Olgilvie, Royal Canadian Golfers Association (RCGA)-owned links are back into tournament shape. Extensive re-seeding of greens, restructuring of the Number 11 hole and work in the fairways and tees passed the close inspection of PGA associate agronomist Dennis Leger last week in the first of the major tests leading up to Canada's most prestigious golfing event. Now Olgilvie wants to show off his course.

Partly because of cash flow problems, and partly because of the RCGA's philosophy about the course, Glen Abbey has opened its doors to all the pay-as-you-play customers it can handle. "We're trying to make Canada's number one golf course more accessible to people of all incomes," said Olgilvie in a recent interview. "More than anything else I'd have to say it is a cash flow problem—it's taken a lot of money to get this course back into shape... Any golf course needs to have a reasonable number of greens fee golfers and tournaments to break even. As costs go up (of operating a course) it becomes more important to get people out," he added. An 18-hole round at Glen Abbey costs \$35 green fees, plus an additional \$15 rental for carts. With two in a cart that amounts to

\$42.50 per golfer per 18-hole round during the peak periods. In an attempt to attract more people, the Abbey has introduced special rates for tee-off times after 4 p.m. During June, July and August green fees have been dropped to \$20 and the cart is no longer a necessity. In September and October the cost for after 4 p.m. golf will drop to \$15. Reservations for morning and early afternoon tee-off times should be made three days in advance, while the after 4 p.m. crowd will have to chance it by waiting in line. "We're getting about five groups out a day after 4 p.m. and we can handle up to seven. It depends on the day too," said Olgilvie, "sometimes there are only three foursomes taking advantage of it." An increasing number of tournaments are being held at the course.
