Heading the board of directors of the local campaign is realtor Gus Goutouski, assisted by Nick Gauthier and Harry Funk. Mr. Goutouski said the actual date for the cam-

paign has not yet been set, but that it would likely be in September or October. Mr. Goutouski said 20 social service agencies

## Youth home sets up shop

The new operators of the former Sheridan Youth Home have set up house following a more than three. week closure of the observation and detention home

The home, serving Peel and Halton regions, was taken over by Casatta Ltd. June 13 as the previous administrative body, Sheridan Youth Association found it could not function with the funds allotted by the Ministry of Community and Social Services. The home, which offers temporary placement of

up to 30 days to 10 juveniles awaiting permanent placement by the courts, has been named Casatta Youth Centre. The facility utilized by Sheridan Youth Association for the past three years on the property of Halton Centennial Manor accepted its first residents since mid-June on July 1 and by the end of the week, four juveniles had been placed

While the doors of the observation and detention home were closed, children were placed in similar facilities located in Hamilton, Kitchener and Oakville.

Diane Kotchendorf of Casatta Ltd. said the operation is now running smoothly following a staff training period during the closure. Casatta Ltd. administrates an observation and detention home in Kitchener and a children's receiving home in that

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## CAS to join Halton Region? Clearance A special committee has been formed to study a

plan to integrate the Halton Children's Aid Society with Regional government.

Members of the health and social services committee last week approved naming four of their members to the nine-person committee.

The initiative for the establishment of the study group came for the CAS Board of directors which has been struggling for several years with an inadequate budget provided by the provincial government.

In a letter to Regional chairman Jack Raftis, CAS president John Graham said he supported the study to determine what benefits there would be to the agency "and particularly to the children whose needs are the first priority of the organization."

Burlington Coun. Walter Mulkewich supported the idea of establishing the committee, but warned that provincial directives and desires would still have to be considered.

"Regardless of what we do we'll be stuck with the directives of the Ministry on children's services, so we should forget any ideas about doing a Halton only kind of thing," he said.

"I'm not expecting a lot in terms of immediate action, but it's still a worthwhile process to go through," he said.

Oakville Coun. Carol Gooding warned that a simple solution to the problems of providing children's service in Halton likely wouldn't come out of the study. "I don't think the overly simplistic solution that'

underlying this report is necessarily the way to go," she said. "If the answer was that simple it would have been done long ago."

The committee studying the proposal will be composed of five members appointed by the CAS and four named by the region.

Regional representatives will be councillors Ted MacDonald of Burlington, Dave Whiting, of Halton Hills, Brad Clements of Milton and Mr. Raftis.

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
