Such was the case last week when Acton Sabres named Bill Richmond to coach their junior club for the 1982-83 season replacing Jules Russiani who decided to step down after a couple of years behind the bench.

The interesting news isn't that Richmond was selected but who came second and third. In second place in the balloting, right behind Richmond, was none other than Milton's own Gary Hudson. The third top candidate was new Milton resident Bob Smulders, a former top NHL prospect until an automobile injury put a damper on his potentially good career. There were six candidates altogether.

The choice for coach, says team spokesman Ray Graham came down to Hudson and Richmond. The five-member selection committee couldn't decide between the two and it went before the 10-member team executive where Richmond won

Hudson, who coaches Milton's Fifth Wheel major bantam team which is slated to travel to Finland during the Christmas break, is known to have coaching aspirations at the junior level. Last year, he almost took over the Flyers after coach Doug Johnston resigned.

Richmond has an arm's length of coaching credentials and had accepted the post of coach for Orangeville in the Mid-Ontario Jr. C League before taking the Acton job.

Richmond coached in the Oakville minor hockey system for many years, despite living halfway between Georgetown and Acton. He coached Oakville's triple-A juvenile team a few years ago to the all-Ontario championships. Many of those players played last year with Oakville Blades which lost just two regular-season games and won the league championship easily.

He is also the Hockey Ontario coordinator for this area and is heavily involved in coaching programs.

Smulders, 29, just moved back to Milton at the end of May after several years as player-coach for Campbellton Tigers in New Brunswick, a senior hockey team.



He had a promising career in junior hockey with Peterborough Petes, playing under coach Roger "Captain Video" Neilson. In his last year of junior, Smulders was injured in a car accident and spent the year in a hospital bed recuperating from leg injuries.

Despite missing a year, he was selected in the fifth round of the junior draft by Buffalo Sabres and spent two years with Cincinnati Swords and Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League. After a year in the Eastern Hockey League with Charlotte, Smulders played in Holland with Den Haag before moving over to Campbellton.

Sticking with hockey, the new name for Milton's junior hockey team is in fact an old name—Steamers.

Peggy Finn, a player with Milton's senior girls' hockey team, picked the name in a recent Champion name-the-team contest and as a result picked up two tickets to an Edmonton Oiler—Toronto Maple Leafs game next year. She submitted 12 entries altogether. (see page 6)

The name Steamers has been the name of Milton's Tier Two hockey teams, at least until this year. Milton Minor Hockey Equipment Manager Larry Scott, in a spirit of good intentions, decided to change the name from Steamers to Jr. Aeros, in respect of Thomas' ownership, at the time, of Milton's intermediate team. Thomas also sponsors the Tier Two teams.

However, Thomas went and purchased the junior club and folded the Aeros putting Scott in a tricky situation.

Royals keep pace with two-game sweep

Milton Royals kept pace with the front-runners in the Halton Senior Baseball League with a pair of relatively easy victories over Burlington Brants in a doubleheader sweep Sunday at Brian Best Park.

Behind the four-hit pitching of Wade Bekar, Royals took the opener 6-2 before they unloaded their heavy artillery blowing away Brants 15-5 in the shortened seven-inning nightcap.

Bekar was the star of the show though. In his first starting assignment of the year, Bekar pitched a no-hitter for six and one-third innings and set down Brants in order in four innings. Bekar started slowly and walked the

first batter he faced. The runner eventually came around to score but Bekar settled down and allowed just five baserunners until the ninth when Burlington bunched together three of its four hits for their second run.

Royals tied the score in the second and took the lead with two runs in the third. The club subsequently added another run in the fifth and two more in the sixth to sew up the victory.

Royals trailed 4-0 in the third before scoring seven runs in the fourth and seven more in the sixth. Turner hit his third consecutive homer in the seventh to complete the scoring.

The centrefielder had four hits altogether to lead Milton's 13-hit attack. The club stranded just four runners in the game.

Cantelon also had a fine effort with

two hits, including a grand-slam homer and six RBIs. Armstrong added three hits while McTrach helped out with a pair of hits and two runs batted in.

Dave Turner earned the win on the mound for Milton going as far as six and one-third innings. Lefty George Moore mopped up in pitching the final two-thirds of an inning.

The two victories enabled Royals to remain in the hunt for the top spots with Campbellville and Dundas. Royals are $3\frac{1}{2}$ back of Mohawks and $1\frac{1}{2}$ back of Dundas. Fourth-place Cambridge is 10 games behind Mohawks and pose no threat at all to third place.
