Tennis courts to be ready for the end of September

Champion News Editor New tennis courts being constructed for the Milton Tennis Club should be ready for play by the third week in September, according to Milton town clerk Roy Main.

A recent agreement between town council and the tennis club has allowed construction of the new courts to proceed this year.

Tenders for the \$268,000 contract will be opened Aug. 11, Mr. Main said recently, and town council will be asked to approve a contract award on Aug.

The first tournament scheduled for the new courts and club house is the Gallinger Cup, planned for the first weekend in October.

The new courts will be located at the north-east corner of the E.C. Drury School for the Hearing Impaired property. Six lighted tennis courts and a club house will be constructed.

The town's parks and recreation department will continue to operate the current courts used by the club in Rotary Park.

"This will breath life not only into our club, but into tennis in this community," said club president Tony Schafer of the project.

In addition to putting up a share of the cost of construction and providing money from its Growth Related Fund, town council is loaning money to the tennis club to assist in the construction.






