## A fishing report from all over

ACCORDING TO Bob Rife, outdoor columnist for The Globe and Mail, fishing has been so-so for the month of July. It is hard to tell a fisherman where to go to catch fish. Fish may be in a certain area one week and long gone the next. Lake Simcoe reports that lake trout fishing has slowed down as hot weather has sent the trout to deeper and cooler water. Bass fishing, however, in Simcoe has been fair off Thorah and Georgina islands and also out from the Pefferlaw River.

Down in Kawartha Lakes, pickerel seems to have disappeared for a few weeks but this happens every year around my summer cottage at Sturgeon Lake. Balsam Lake seems to be giving up some good pickerel. Reports are that bass fishing with leeches has been good in Buckhorn and Balsam lakes.

Up at my old stomping ground, Lake Nipissing, bass fishing has been good around the Manitow islands. A few pickerel were taken from Nipissing around shoals and sharp drop-offs.

The old standby, the lowly perch were hitting well. We wonder how many fishermen would have come home had it not been for the sweet tasting perch. People are also finding that Blue gills and sunfish are also delicious eating if they have any size to them.

On Lake Temagami, a favourite spot for many club members, pickerel were hitting good in the evening. Lake trout fishing was fair to good if you had a good guide, Montreal River is not giving up the fish that it usually does at this time of the year.

Fishing in Lake Ontario is very slow, but brown trout up to 14 lbs. and lake trout up to 17 lbs. were taken about six miles out in the lake and down very deep. There were a few coho salmon caught out from Oakville also a long way out and down deep. Lake Erie, the lake officials said was past the point of no return, has been producing fish as good or better than the rest of the Great Lakes.

Bass and pike fishing were excellent last week in Long Point Bay. A fish or two were weighed in at 4 lbs. 12 oz. for largemouth bass, and a Brantford angler, Ernie Millar, caught a 4 lb. 4 oz. smallmouth.

Up in Lake Huron, one of the hardest lakes to fish on account of its rocky shoals and shore line, they were catching some lovely channel catfish at the mouth of the Saugeen River. A few salmon were taken out of Port Elgin.

Two large muskies netted by Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources personnel from the Kawartha Lakes are recuperating after their recent flight from Toronto to Tokyo in preparation for a five city tour as part of an exhibit arranged by a Japanese newspaper chain. Japan is one of the largest fish-eating nations in the world.
