

Follow the rules when hunting

ITH THE HUNTING season fast approaching, there is always a great many people who don't follow the simple rules.

This year, the Ministry of Natural Resources has it all written out for you in their summary of the Hunting Regulation. These pamphlets are readily available from sports stores and resorts who cater to hunters. The Halton Sportsmen's Association only got a limited number this year.

For those of you who do not know the rules and regulations, here are a few simple rules for you to follow:

-Every person must have a valid licence to hunt any animal or bird and must have it with him while hunting. He must show it to a conservation officer if requested to do so.

—A person must not participate in lunting or killing any species unless he has a licence to hunt that species. Protected animals may be hunted only during an open season.

-Residents and non-residents must be 16 years of age or older before being eligible for a licence to hunt. Residents only may apply at 15-years providing they first obtain consent in writing from both parents or a legal guardian.

-Contact your local police department for information about the requirements for firearm ownership. Firearms acquisition certificate and Minors Permits (for those under 16 years of age).

The rules you are about to read are the same as they have been for years. But we all should read and study them to improve our hunting manners. They are also posted in many sportsmen's clubs.

1. Request permission to hunt and conduct yourself so that you will always be welcome in the future. Always consider yourself an invited guest of the landowner.

2. Invite the landowner to hunt with you, follow his advice on areas to hunt and offer to share your game with him.

3. Hunt, only in areas designated by the

3. Hunt only in areas designated by the landowner and observe safety zones around buildings.

4. Demonstrate you are a responsible and ethical hunter by obeying firearm safety rules, game laws and regulations. Insist that your companions do likewise.

5. Respect the landowners' equipment, livestock and fences. Leave all gates as you found them. Report any damage you see to the landowner.

6. Control your dog and stay out of unharvested crops.

7. Pick up all spent shell cases and litter.

8. Acquire the skills and knowledge of a responsible hunter by continually improving your markmanship and your knowledge of wildlife species field care of game and principles of wildlife management.

9. Support Conservation efforts, wildlife management programs and provide an example to broaden public understanding of hunting.

10. Thank the landowner for the privilege of hunting on his land.

We think if all of us followed these few simple rules, there would not be so many lands with "No Trespassing" and "No Hunting" signs.




