# Making hookers happy

Rural residents wanting to hook up to Halton's water mains should find the process a little easier

in the future. Members of the Region's planning and public works and administration and finance committees last week approved a policy allowing rural homeowners to connect to water mains running down their roads.

The connections will be allowed only after a contract is signed under which the homeowners agree to disconnect if an amendment to the Halton official plan, which would make the connections legal, is not approved.

The Region's official plan currently doesn't allow connections to the water system outside urban areas. An amendment to change that policy has been approved by Regional council but still has not obtained necessary approval from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

Dennis Perlin, Halton's chief administrative officer, said the new policy would apply only in areas where there are already water mains running down the roads.

"It's simply permissive in an area where a main

happens to be running by," he said.

Rural homes allowed these connections will still have to rely on private sewage disposal systems, and that caused some concern for committee members who worried that the increased water usage resulting from the connection would overload the septic system.

"That is a concern, but it doesn't seem to be a severe problem," commented public health in-spector Gerry Sullivan, "because rural people seem to be quite skilled at rationing water."

"I don't think people should be denied municipal water just because their septic system might get into trouble," he added.

Mr. Perlin added that councillors needn't worry about having to extend a sewer system into the

countryside if these problems did occur. The agreements signed with the homeowners would require them to install holding tanks and "take all other necessary actions before we would Yellowknife. extend a municipal sewage system out there," he

Mr. Sullivan added that new rural residents, unfamiliar with the needs of septic systems, could learn from their neighbors.




