No big surprises yet on the Star's Great Salmon Hunt, although some nice fish in the 10 to 15 lb. class have already been caught. Salmon fishing should hit its peak about the middle of the month when the fish start to school up just a mile or less from shore.

Now that the nights are getting cooler, sportsmen turn their thoughts to hunting, moose, deer, etc.

Speaking of hunting reminds me of the wonderful days I used to spend up around Sharbot Lake with the boys on our annual Thanksgiving weekend, and the beautiful feeds of partridge we used to have after we got home. Partridge or Ruffled Grouse'call them what you like has saved many a hunting trip for deer or moose from being a complete disaster just as lowly sunfish, perch, and bluegill has saved many a fishing trip from a mere few big fish to a beautiful feast of these several tasting fish.

Ontarios most widely distributed and sought after game bird is the Ruffled Grouse or as it is better known in the beer drinking circles the Partridge" In some parts of the province the bird is barnyard tame, and that is why the Indians used to sometime call it the "Fool Hen".

In other areas, it is so wild some hunters have yet to see their first one on the ground. Eastern Ontario is defined as that part of

the province east of a rough line from Ottawa through Smith's Falls to Kingston. Generally this region is relatively flat limestone country with small rivers and creeks formed here and there, a scattering of well wooded woodlots. and the occasional mosquito swamp and bog.

The number of grouse vary from place to place and from year to year in cycles that are not fully understood. Never are there too many birds.

After Friday night's 9-8 victory over Grimsby Peach Kings, Martin was so distraught with 'the play of his defensive corps and some of his for-wards that he figured he would have the team picked by Monday. He was very concerned about the lack of hustle shown by the players and wondered aloud if any of them really wanted to earn a spot on the club.

However, following Milton's 8-4 decision over Grimsby in Hamilton on Saturday, Steamers management found themselves back at square

According to Lee, the entire team played well enough to earn jobs.

"We were very pleased with the hustle shown by the boys on Saturday," he said. "They didn't stop working.

The Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) will permit Milton to dress 19 players among them seven

Comets last year and John Turner, a 17-year-old defenceman who played for Milton Major Midget Comets last year. Lee will sign those in that group who he feels can best help the club.

Asked where, if anywhere, there are weak spots, Lee said the right wing and defence are areas where he, Meloff and Martin will be concentrating

Goaltenders Lee is looking at include Duane Martens, a 17-year-old import who played with Brampton Major Midgets last year; Todd Foley, a 17-year-old import who played for Burlington Triple 'A' Midgets last year and Shawn Dainard, a 17year-old import who played in Toronto last year. Lee is also expected to look at Derek Neelands, an 18-year-old tender who played with Milton Junior 'B' Flyers and Milton Juveniles last year. He is not an import and, as yet, has not visited camp.

"There are others still coming to camp," Lee said. "We are not hurrying to set the team and have done a complete housecleaning from last year. There's going to be a different attitude on this team compared to last year-that's understood by everybody.

Lee expects to have a set team by Steamers' first league game against Burlington on Sept. 30 in Burlington. Steamers' first home game is Oct. 1 against Oakville. Milton plays Buffalo here on Friday night and is in Buffalo on Saturday.






