Cracking down on goons

In an effort to crack down on overly aggressive players, the Milton Hockey League (MHL) has introduced two key rules relating to body contact and the numbers of penalties assessed per game.

MHL president Bruce Hood said any player who is penalized four times in any particular game for any combination of minor or major infractions will be ejected for the remainder of that match.

"One of the prime purposes of our league is to promote fellowship and good sportsmanship for players who live in town," Hood said. "We want to have the best calibre of hockey possible and, as far as that goes, we're not too far behind the White Oaks Hockey League (WOHL) on Sunday evenings."

MHL games are played from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Sunday evenings. Three games are scheduled during that time span.

The second rule, which Hoods says will require some judgment on the part of officials supplied to the league by the Milton Referees' Association (MRA), deals with bodychecking.

Players running their opponents into the boards or the net using excessive, injurious force to manipulate them will be ejected from the game and will face further discipline by the league.

Hood added violations such as stick swinging or using the stick to deliberately injure an opponent will fall under the new ruling.

"We don't want the players running each other, cross checking or slamming each other from behind in a way that is going to injure," Hood said. "These guys have to get up to work the next morning. We don't want goon hockey at this level."

Steve Gervais, a former Milton Merchants Junior "C" defenceman now coaching the MHL champion Racer's Edge club, supported both rules with some reservation.

"The four-penalty rule is a good rule—it will

keep the overly aggressive player down," he said. "However, the league has to make sure the referees don't get carried away."

Gervais, although supportive of any attempt by the league to cut out goon hockey, said the second rule will be "a very discretionary call by the referee."

"What's the difference between this call and boarding, charging and cross checking?" Gervais asked. "This could hurt some teams very much because it is a rule that will affect defencemen. Some teams could lose key hockey players during a game because of loose interpretation by a referee."

The MHL begins its regular season Oct. 17. Exhibition games will be played Oct. 3 and 10. The 50 players who were drafted last week will fill about 20 openings in the six-team league will, if they and others are not able to catch on with their assigned clubs, be eligible for a re-entry draft on Oct. 4.

Aside from this year's draft, teams were permitted to protect players scouted during the off-season. Where they finished in last year's standings determined how many they were permitted to protect.

As an example, Racer's Edge were permitted to protect one player. The player just happened to be former Milton Junior "B" Flyer defenceman Mike Murray. However, Murray and former Milton Junior "B" Flyer teammate Paul McCann had planned to attend training camp with the Cambridge Senior "A" Hornets last Sunday night.

Murray will decide within two weeks whether or not he will play for Racer's Edge—a move which would unite him with cousins Brent and Richard Murray.

McCann said he will attempt to make teams playing senior hockey this year.

The trading deadline is Jan. 31, 1983.

Each team is permitted to carry 18 players and two goaltenders.
