# New MHL power emerging

For several years, Miltonwe Realty (formerly Halton Hogs and Pro-Clean) has languished at the bottom of the Milton Hockey League.

Winners of just five games over the past two years, Miltonwe Realty has changed a lot of things this year. Early indications are that coach Dave Dermo and assistant coach Ray Deleagarde (the guiding force behind the changes) have assembled a contending team already. And this before the club has even played its first exhibition game.

After partially dropping its image as a policeman's team last year, the club has listed just a few police officers in its crew this year.

Shrewd draft selection, a number of trades and excellent signings of "free agents" should make things much more competitive for the Miltonwe crew.

For starters, Miltonwe drafted Duane Stark, late of the Milton Juniors, as its and the league's first draft selection. A noted fireballer with a never-say-die attitude, Stark should make the transition from junior easily.

Miltonwe was granted additional early draft picks in an effort to bolster its corps which was depleted to about eight by the beginning of this year.

The club was granted an extra pick in each succeeding round and used those picks to select Brad Roelfson, Tim Smelko, John Crawford, goalie Don Bell, Earl Shepherd, Len Coulson, Mike Tagliaferri and Warren Selch.

Miltonwe coach Dermo then went out and made a killing in the "free-agent" market which would have done the Toronto Blue Jays proud.

Short of goalies, Dermo enticed Mike Shepherd, formerly with Milton Flyers to suit up. Shepherd is a university student at Waterloo but has indicated a willingness to play.

Dermo then received assurances from no less than three members of the now-defunct Milton Aeros. Centreman Bob Baker, right winger Dave Norton and left winger Paul McCann each will play. He also picked up Keith Michie and Wayne Broughton to give the club a solid base.

But he wasn't done yet and in three trades last week, Dermo picked up three players while giving away five. It is rather ironic that Miltonwe found themselves with too many players.

First off, Dermo dispatched Crawford, who was picked up in the draft, to The Racer's Edge for Larry Scott. He then traded Miltonwe's top scorer from last year, John Volpe, to Lou's Place Hawks for reliable defenceman John Dent, filling the lone weakness in the Miltonwe club.

To cap a busy week, Dermo traded Bell, Selch and Smelko to Milton Chrysler-Dodge for Ernie McConnell.

But Miltonwe wasn't the only club to strengthen itself although none of the other clubs has yet shown, on paper, the same amount of improvement.

The Racer's Edge, league champion the past two years, has added former Flyer Mike Murray and John Arnold to its already outstanding defence corps. Both goalies, Al Horney and Dave Ballard will be back.

John Burns Stable, runners-up the past two years after dominating the league for five years, picked up Todd Corradetti, and Ed Loeprich in the

draft and then traded centreman Don Habkirk to Straight Line Fence for Dave Heipel. Phil Bailey, arguably the league's best goalie, will be back.

Lou's Place, third pace finishers the past couple of years, will improve it only for the return of Rick Bridgman who did not play last year although he remained on the club's roster.

The team also picked up Paul Jarvie and Jim Newman in the draft and traded Dent for Volpe, a proven scorer.

Straight Line, the club with the traditional habit of starting well and finishing poorly, fortified its team with the addition of Bruce Ellison, Rob Champoux, Randy McDonald, Wayne Johnston and Habkirk.

The league's Achilles heel may very well be Milton Chrysler-Dodge which listed the least number of players on its pre-season roster.

The league begins exhibition action Oct. 3 with regular season play beginning Oct. 17.
