Expansion plans face City, Region trouble

Special to The Champion Recent plans to expand Lowville United Church put the congregation in the middle of a road allowance debate with the City of Burlington and Halton Region.

The present church has stood at the corner of what is now Britannia Rd. and Guelph Line since 1873. The land was part of a parcel of land granted by King George III to Joseph Colling in 1821.

The church, done in solid Gothic Revival style, has since been called Lowville Methodist Church, Lowville Wesley and Methodist Church, Lowville Church, and finally, Lowville United Church. As surrounding population expanded, Lowville retained its small town dimensions and its strong sense of community. Motor vehicle traffic started to flow through the village which lies to the north of Burlington after World War I, and roads were constructed and improved to accommodate changing transportations needs.

Through all the changes and encroaching modernity, little of the church's original structure altered. The small belfry remains in place, pointed arched windows at the sides and over the entrance of the solid brick structure continue to dominate the increasingly busy corner.

After receiving last January a development permit from the Niagara Escarpment Commission construction for an addition which would hold Sunday school facilities, an office for the minister and access ramps to accommodate wheelchair entry, the congregation applied to the City of Burlington for a building permit.

A site plan had to be submitted to the City as part of the approval process.

The congregation qas very surprised when informed by the City that the church would be required to deed over 17 feet on the Britannia Road side and 27 feet on the side of the building which faces Guelph Line to accommodate road widening efforts planned for the area.

Spokesman for the church, Eric Gudgeon explains losing 17 feet of property facing Britannia Road means losing part of the church wall on that side, while a loss of 27 feet which faces Guelph

Line means losing one-quarter of the front of the church.

Families, descended from original church trustees who have been part of the congregation' since 1833 were naturally upset at the news, says Mr. Gudgeon listing area families descending from Henry Foster, Thomas Colling and Charles

After much negotiation with the City development committee, City Council declared last May that as long as the church stood on its present site, it would be allowed to retain its original 66-foot road allowance.

The congregation breathed a collective sigh of relief only to discover that a similar agreement with Region would not be secured without a fight.


Halton's plans to develop Guelph Line also included a 27-foot piece of church land in its road reconstruction program, already partially completed on Guelph Line between Highway No. 5 and No.1 Side Rd. to include a truck climbing lane for west-bound traffic.

Further reconstruction efforts in the area are not anticipated in the very near future.

Lowville United Church has negotiated an agreement with Region outlining Council's right to take the required 27 feet after five years and, pending the outcome of a feasibility study, a road allowance will be established, hopefully not in access of 10 feet, says Mr. Gudgeon.

"Basically, both parties bought time," he observes, noting his objections to a \$200 lawyers fee demanded by Region for drawing up the agree-

Meanwhile, the church, though modest in its architectural expression remains rooted in area tradition and future expectation.
