United Way supports VON

The Victorian Order of Nurses have been providing nursing care to Canadians in their own homes since 1897. The specific nature of the services the VON provides has always been flexible, responding to the needs of the population at any given time.

The VON is a non-profit agency, run by a volunteer Board of Directors, the Halton Board has 12 members. The branch is directed by Mrs. Margaret MacLeod, and has a staff of 3 secretaries, 15 full time and 17 part time nurses.

All the nurses have extensive experience and approximatley half of them have University degress. All nurses attend frequent educational and updating seminars.

All nursing care is given under the direction of the client's physician or surgeon. Types of services include assessment of the needs of the elderly or handicapped, assistance with hygiene and personal care, teaching procedures associated with illnesses such as diabetes, postoperative care to inscisions, injections, supervision of vital signs, ostomy care, palliative care to the terminally ill, and any other care which can safety be provided in the home.

The nurses also have extensive knowledge of facilities available in the area and frequently refer to other agencies when appropriate.

Approximately 70 per cent of the visits made are provided as part of the provincial government's Home Care Program. The remainder are covered by other government programs such as WCB. DVA or by the client's own insurance, or at a fee depending on the client's ability to pay.

One full time and two part time nurses serve the Milton and Campbellville area, driving more than 20,000 km per year and making more than 2,500 visits.

Most visits are made between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., but a nurse will visit at any time 7 days a week 24 hours a day if indicated by the client's needs, some people being seen several times a

The nurse on call can be reached at any time of the day or night by phoning 878-5773. Carolyn Keyworth is the nurse for this area.

Gus not served

Mayoralty candidate Gus Goutouski has yet to be served a writ filed on behalf of Milton Ward 1 Coun. Don McMillan.

At press time, the action, which also includes developer Brian Ambler and his firm for alleged damages amounting to \$250,000, had yet to be serv-

Paperwork relating to the lawsuit was filed Friday in the Supreme Court of Ontario. The Champion erroneously reported the lawsuit was to be initiated last week. However, until Mr. Goutouski is served, it isn't.

Conflict of interest charges against Mr. McMillan were scheduled to be aired today. Mr McMillan will answer charges that he broke provincial conflict of interest regulations when he

voted in June to cut a subdivision by four lots. The development is located across the road from land Mr. McMillan owns in Moffatt. The four lots he wanted cut from the development are in front of his house.

Lawyers for Mr. McMillan and Mr. Ambler appeared in court last week and agreed the case could be settled over two days of hearings.

"It is of great importance to Mr. McMillan to have thismatter disposed of as quickly as possible because of the upcoming elections," lawyer Noel Bates told County Court judge Kenneth Blair.
Peter McWilliams, acting for Mr. Ambler, agreed the impending vote made a decision on the question urgent.

"It's a matter of great public importance that the ratepayers should know if Don McMillan has committed a conflict of interest," he said. See Our Readers Write for Goutouski letter.

One of the reasons Tony Fiorita tossed in his hat was to eliminate the possibility of an acclamation. Mr. Fiorita is a teacher who practises his profession in another area. He says he is running to represent the children-not the teachers. He is involved with the Milton Minor Baseball Association as a coach, house league convener and maintenance director.

Bob Banning is the sole competition for Ward 2

Milton Hydro Electric Commission incumbents Charles Thompson and Bill Rowney. A resident of Milton for 15 years, Mr. Banning is making his second attempt to obtain a position with the local commission. He is self-employed in investments and money management. The 57-year-old veteran of the Royal Canadian Air Force was employed by the Montreal Star and Toronto Star for a combined 20 years.

As announced in mid-August, former Ward 2 Regional Coun. Gus Goutouski is challenging Milton Mayor Gord Krantz. Mr. Krantz has a 15year history as a local councillor and has just completed his first two-year term as mayor.

The 45-year-old was born and raised in Milton and, until taking over as mayor from Don Gordon in 1980, was self- employed in the oil heating supply business. Mr. Krantz and his wife Olive have two grown children. Mr. Krantz was also firefighter with the local department.

After one year as Regional councillor, Mr.

Goutouski lost his seat to Brad Clements in the 1980 election. The real estate broker is currently chairman of the board of The Centre and chairman of the Milton United Way.

In the past his community involvement has included the chairmanship of Milton District Hospital Board, Easter Seal campaign, president of Milton Chamber of Commerce and president of the Rotary Club of Milton.

Mr. Watson, who had filed nomination papers to seek re-election as a local Ward 3 councillor as well as Regional councillor for Wards 1 and 3, had not withdrawn his name from Regional competitons at press time.

However, his papers filed in an effort to regain his Ward 3 seat were filed first and will take precedence over his other nomination attempt.

Had he chose to run as a Regional councillor, he would have faced incumbent Bill Johnson, who was acclaimed.




