Halton Women's Place

The September meeting of the John Milton Chapter of the I.O.D.E. was held at the home of Mrs. E.W. Foster with Regent Mrs. Marie Clements in the chair welcoming members after the summer recess.

It will be the 25th year for bridge and cuchre games of 32 tables held twice a month in different homes affording the opportunity of friendship as well as meeting many new residents of Milton.

More than one million dollars is raised and spent annually through the efforts of 15,000 volunteer IODE members across Canada. The major portion of this money is directed to local community work with the remainder going toward National and Provincial I.O.D.E. projects.

Ontario chapters have spent \$150,000 on genetic counselling clinics in Northern Ontario and IODE Fellowships in Clinical Genetics, purchased 40 brailling machines for volunteer braillists, and offers \$6,000 annually in bursaries, and awards in ecology, ballet, art, teaching and library science.


Our guest speaker was Mrs. May Bell who was introduced by Mrs. E. Devlin and thanked by Mrs. F. Thompson. Mrs. Bell gave a very informative talk on Halton Women's Place which is an emergency shelter for abused women and their children and located in Milton with a staff of five members plus two placement students and volunteers. It was opened in October, 1980, and over 300 crisis calls were received over and above the actual intake during the first year with the numbers steadily increasing.

The operating budget for 1982 is \$130,000 with 75 per cent of this covered by Halton Region, and the remainder raised elsewhere. It is on the list of charities to be funded by the United Way.


