Halton Region budget spared protectionism

Halton Region's 1983 budget will be spared the "protectionism" of some committee members, Regional council decided last week.

Councillors voted to have the administration and finance committee serve as the final review of the document before it is presented to council next year.

While members of the administration and finance committee had recommended they be the final review stage, Burlington Coun. Walter Mulkeiwich argued unsuccessfully that a composite committee should take that role.

"Each of the standing committees should be represented on budget review, that would be consistent with the policies we've established," Mr. Mulkeiwich argued.

"It would be good for the process to have some cross-pollination from the other committees," he added.

Burlington Coun. Joan Little, however, argued that members of the other committees wouldn't bring an impartial attitude to the review of the budget.

"There would be too much protectionism built in this way," she said. "It's not a good alternative if our goal is good financial management."

Under the budget review process approved by Council, Regional staff prepare their estimates for the year, submit them to chief administrative officer Dennis Perlin, then to the various standing committees and then to administration and finance and council for a final review.

"This is designed to make the whole process easier to handle than it was

last year," Mr. Perlin told councillors.

In a report of the administration and finance committee, Mr. Perlin and former treasurer Gerry Lawson said that even if the Region does not expand its programs and services next year a mill rate increase of more than 10 per cent will be required.

If Halton's current programs continue into 1983, the report stated, the Region would have to raise \$22.8 million through taxes, a mill rate increase of 10.5 per cent over 1982.

Anything less than that amount would mean cuts in the services available from the upper tier.

Burlington Mayor Roly Bird noted that during the years Regional government has been operating in Halton, residents have endured average tax increases of 12 per cent.

"This plan will only work if every member of council works to help keep the lid on," he said.

One of the proposals being extended to help control the rise in Regional costs, Mr. Perlin added, is striving for an increase of no more than 6 per cent in the total salary bill paid by the Region.

The effect of a recent Provincial announcement of financial restraint, he added, won't be known for about a week.

"At no other time have we been in this financial situation," commented Mrs. Little. "We have never had as good a handle on our spending as we do now. For the first time we can take pride and say the Region is working financially."
