





(b) a person who is certified by a legally qualified medical practitioner, by certificate filed with the Clerk Co-ordinator, to be physically incapable of attending a polling

(c) a person absent from his regular residence by reason of attending an educational institution and who is entered in the list for the polling subdivision in which he normally resides and who expects by reason of such absence to be unable to vote at the advance polls or on polling day; or

(d) a person who expects to be absent from his polling subdivision during the election period including the advance polls and polling day by reason of his being engaged for hire or reward in the business of transportation by railway, air, water or motor vehicle.
