

All were interspersed with many very interesting anecdotes. Mrs. Robertson was visiting and travelling in Africa with a niece who teaches Secondary School there near Gabarone.

There was an interesting and different train trip from Gabarone, Botswana to Bulawaya, Zimbabwe. They travelled by rented car in Zimbabwe and visited a game reserve, a crocodile farm, Wanke Farm, native villages. Learned about educational systems, and saw many native animals and birds.

An enjoyable Christmas, and a different one was spent in Botswana, near Gabarone.
