There was an interesting and different train trip from Gabarone, Botswana to Bulawayo, Zimbabwe. They travelled by rented car in Zimbabwe and visited a game reserve, a crocodile farm, Wanke Farm, native villages. Learned about educational systems, and saw many native animals and birds.

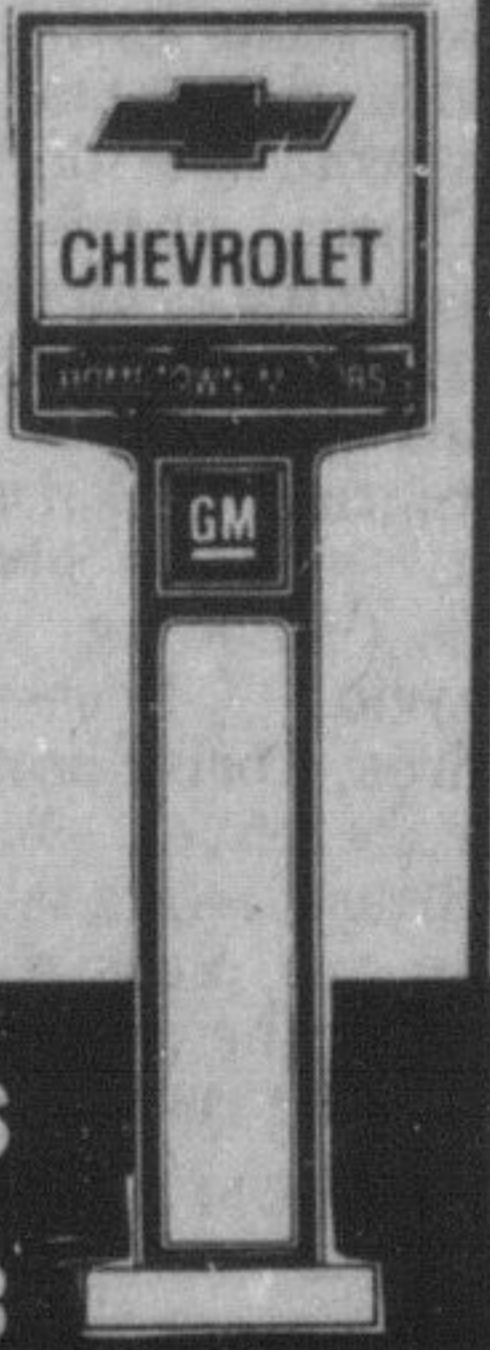
An enjoyable Christmas, and a different one was spent in Botswana, near Gabarone.

**Former resident dies in Toronto**

Donald McNabb, a former area resident, passed away suddenly at Toronto Western Hospital on Nov. 3, aged 66 years.

He was born in Wellington County, the eldest son of Malcolm and Jessie Young McNabb, and lived for 50 years on the family farm on the 8th Line of Esqueping. He attended Ashgrove Public School and was active in the Junior Farmers Association.

In 1949 he married Vera Wilson of Milton. Employed by the Federal Government as a Livestock Products Grader for 26 years, he lived and worked in Dundas, Kitchener, Windsor and Ottawa before moving to Toronto in 1963, where he lived at the time of his death.

Donald took an early retirement in 1972, because of his health, and for 7 years spent the winters in Tennessee. He is survived by his

wife Vera and three brothers, John of Georgetown, Angus of Clifford and Fraser of Embo.

Brother Walter Trubyk conducted the funeral service from McKersies Funeral Home in Milton with interment in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

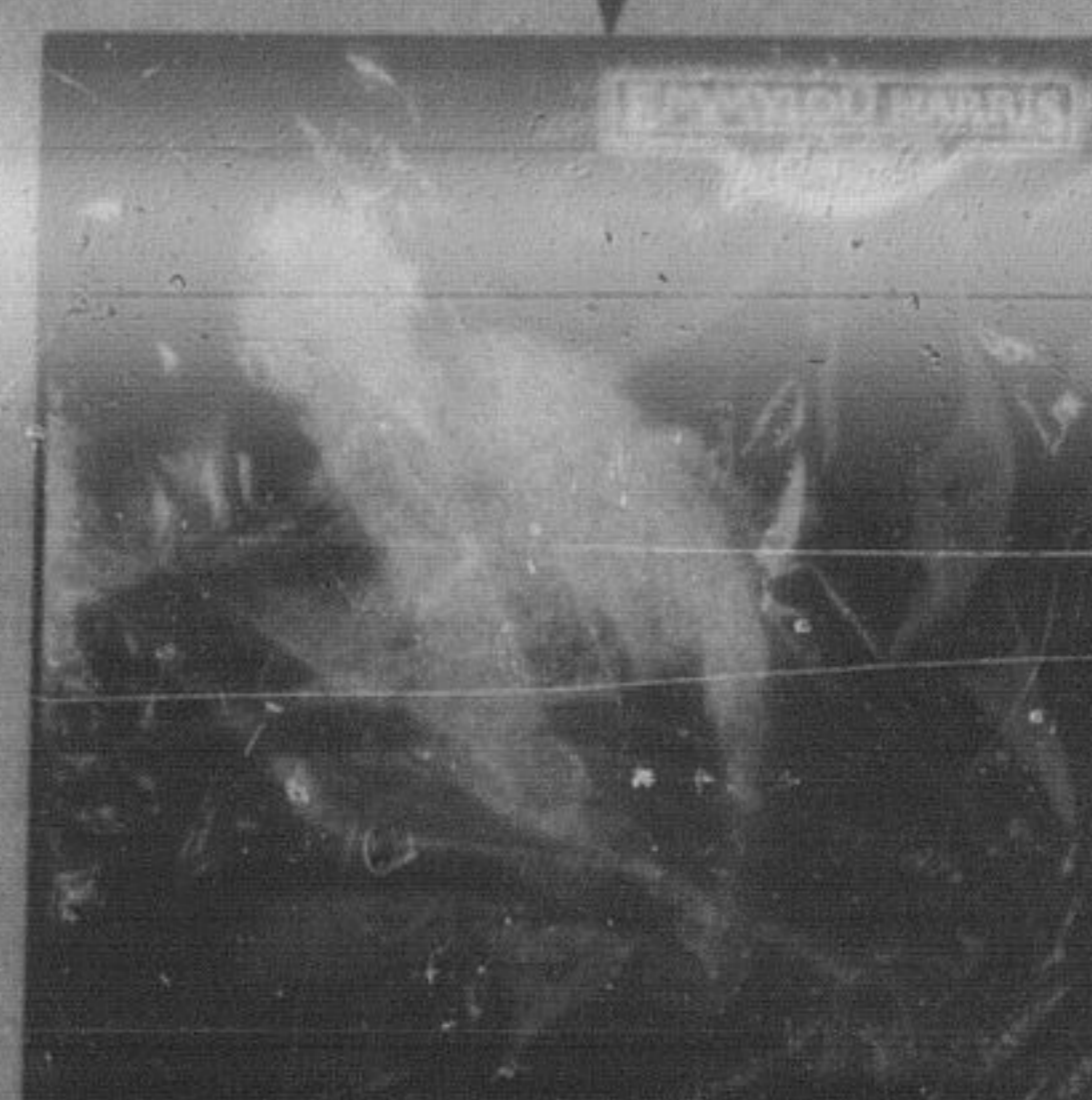

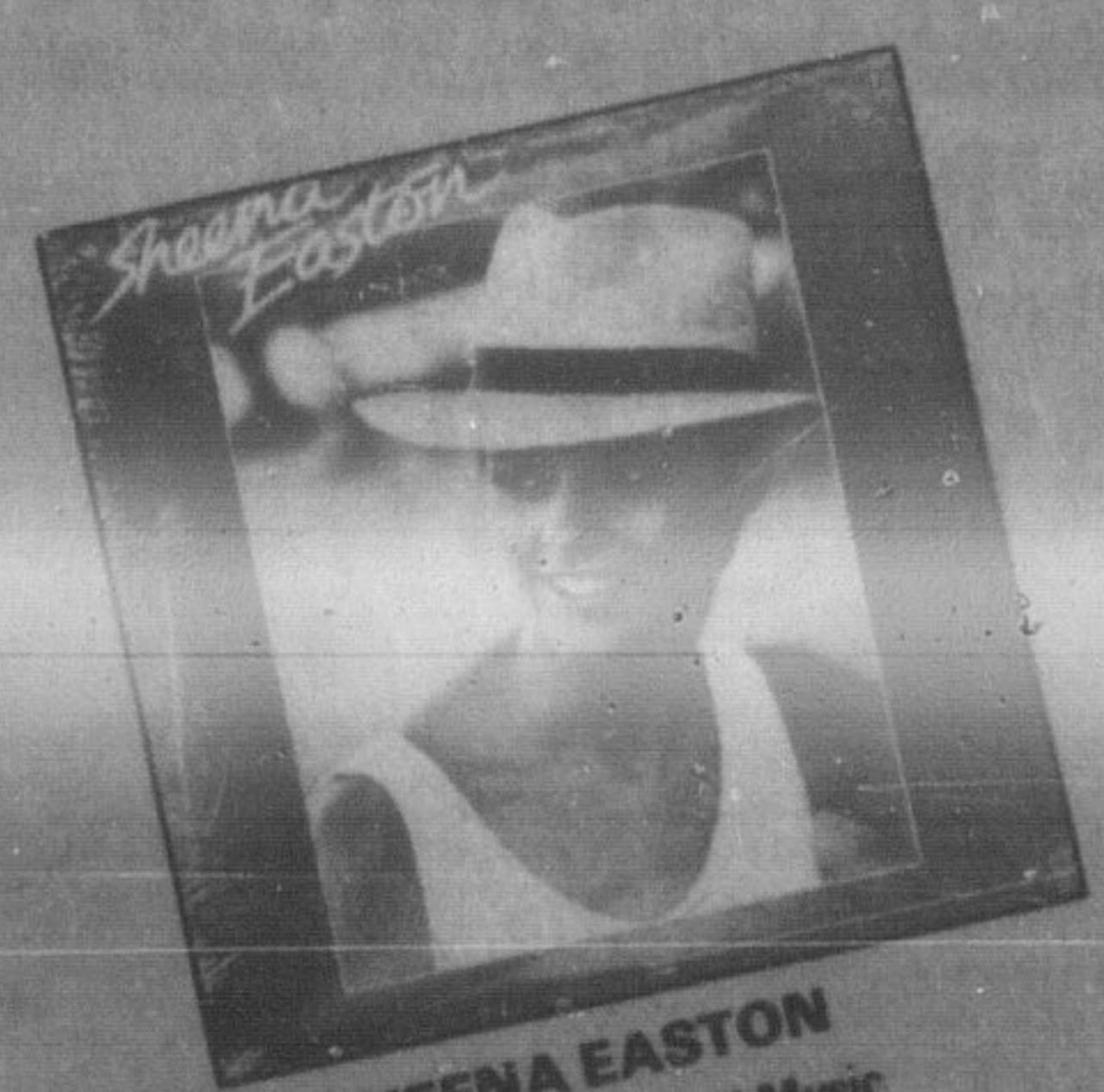

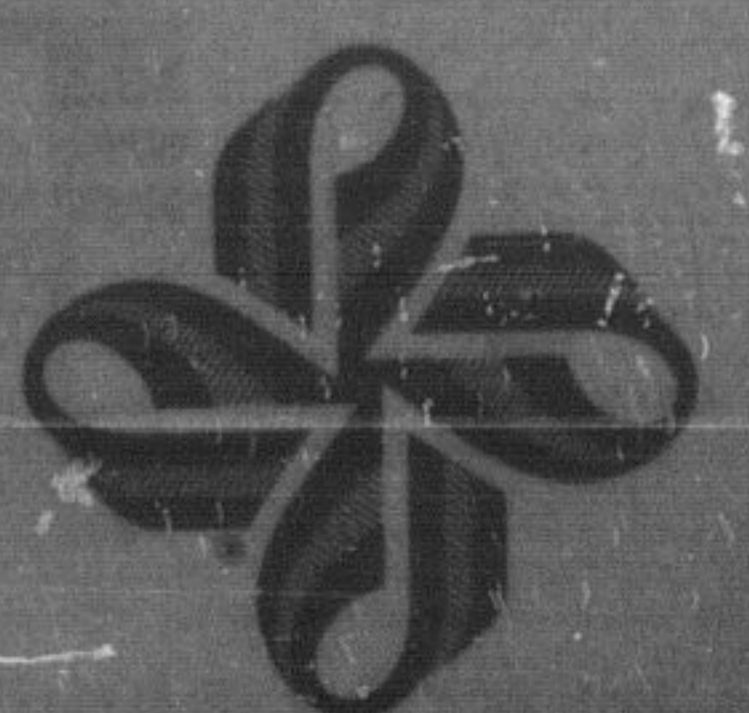
