

Peewees continue to roll with 4th win in a row

A great team effort, their finest of the year, and Doug Poulton's winning goal with just 30 seconds remaining enabled Miltonwe Realty peewee Jr. Aeros to earn a 4-3 win over Burlington Majors in Tier Two hockey action last Monday at Burlington.

The victory, coupled with a subsequent 4-0 whitewash of Orangeville,

left Milton with a perfect 4-0 record in its first four league games.

Against Burlington, Milton received a hustling team effort. The club's defencemen played their best defensive game as a unit which helped support the standout goalkeeping of Steve Wicwazyk.

Milton jumped in front quickly 2-0

less than two minutes into the game. Kevin Campbell opened the scoring from Shawn Hasselfeldt and Doug Carles before Carles doubles the lead with a goal from Scott Charlton.

Burlington roared back in the second period tying the score at two with a pair of quick tallies.

In the third period, Burlington took its first lead with a goal five minutes

into the frame. Colin Grieve got that one back a minute later converting a play with Jason Campbell and Pat Penman.

Poulton scored the winner when his slapshot from the point struck the low right side of the goal with just 30 seconds left on the clock.

Against Orangeville Saturday at

Memorial Arena, Milton scored twice in the first period and added two more in the middle frame to coast with the 4-0 win.

Grieve paced Milton with two goals. Doug Carles scored once and added a single while Jeff Closs added a single. Hasselfeldt led the assist-makers with two while Penman and Mike Stephens each earned one assist apiece.

Lee going back to race in a big way

For many years, rally driver Bob Lee pursued his favorite sport at his own expense. The Milton driver started racing as a past-time in Alberta and now after a succession of four championships will go for a bigger title—and he'll get paid.

In February, Lee officially starts with New Zealander Clive Smith as part of the Ford USA team. They'll be taking part in the American national rally series with a complete sponsorship and a salary. All they'll do is drive.

It marks quite a turning point in his career which began seven years in Alberta. Bob and his wife Carol, racing a Cooper S which they still have (and yes it still runs) took part in the Alberta rally series and won it. Lee was now firmly addicted to the sport.

Five years back, Bob shifted to the navigating side and teamed with Alister Aiken of Oakville. First off, they won the Ontario novice championship and after two years they captured the provincial championship in a Toyota.

The car belonged to the team but the team managed to pick up some local sponsorships which helped defray the equipment costs.

But all along, the pair had to fork over their own money to support their sport. As a self-employed welding inspector, Bob had little trouble taking time off work but the costs of running a machine, plus travelling expenses, were not light.

The Toyota was well used and presently exists only in parts.

"We were up at the Rally of the Tall Pines in Sudbury," explained Bob, "and we saw parts of the car still on other cars. A rear axle here, the suspension over there, it was interesting to see."

The duo split for the 1981 season with Bob meeting up with Randy Black of Mississauga. This marked another major change in sponsorships. Datsun supplied the car and parts and shared the team's travelling expenses.

The team met with instant success. The pair rolled up an early lead on five-time Canadian champion Taisto Heinenen and were never threatened. Within their first year of trying, the pair had a national championship under their belts.

At the conclusion of the 1981 season, Lee retired from rally driving. He has not raced since winning the national title.

A few months back, Bob received a call from driver Clive Smith with an opportunity to race in the US with a sponsored car, all expenses paid and a salary. Bob thought it over for about two seconds and agreed.

They'll be racing a factory built Ford Escort. The car is being prepared in England where it will be converted from front-wheel drive to rear-wheel drive.

The two will be part of a 12-member team entering two cars. One will participate in the production class while Smith and Lee will handle the open class.

The car is part of the Ford USA team. Actually, all the leg work is being done by Marketing Corp. of American which also enters cars in endurance races such as the Le Mans 24-hour.

Smith is no stranger to rally driving. The New Zealander raced well in Canada and moved to Calgary. He has subsequently moved to Detroit where the proximity to both the car's headquarters and Lee will be an asset to the team. Smith raced a year-and-a-half with Team Datsun.

The Ford USA team will consist of two mechanics and a transport leader per car. All the racing team will be required to do is race.

The plan calls for them to race all 12 events in the States for the national championships and three, possibly, in Canada. Their major competition will come from John Buffum, of Vermont, in an Audi Quattro. The Escort has been modified from 72 horsepower to 260 hp., but even with that, the four-wheel drive Quattro is 40 hp., more powerful.

"It'll be a lot of pressure," says Bob, "there's no doubt about it. I've got a lot of experience and so does Clive so I think we'll be able to handle it. Clive has raced all over Canada and in Europe so I don't see it as much of a problem for him."

The first event for the team will be Feb. 12-13 in Dallas Texas.

Just because the winter is upon us, it doesn't necessarily mean that running should come to end.

As a matter of fact, Athletiques International is organizing distance running from Milton District High School. The group meets every Wednesday at 5:30 p.m. at the school and go on a leisurely run.

Chrysler gets super charged

Gain first win, JBS back on top, Racer's rally to tie

A highly entertaining night of hockey action saw Milton Chrysler-Dodge pick up its first win of the year. The Racer's Edge rally with three goals in the final 82 seconds to tie, and John Burns Stable go back on top of the Milton Hockey League Sunday.

Chrysler-Dodge capped their strongest performance all season with two late goals to pull a 5-3 victory out of the hat from Miltonwe Realty. The Racer's Edge battled back with a superlative effort over the final seconds to draw even with Straight Line Fence 6-6 after JB Stable, supported by the outstanding goalkeeping of Phil Bailey, edged Lou's Place Hawks 3-1 for sole possession of first place.

Chrysler-Dodge was led by the tic-tac-toe line of Pat Haggart, Peter Rota and Roger Delnin. The line had a hand in four goals and could have had more as the club struck four goal posts including three in the first period alone.

It marked the first win of the season for MCD, coach Barrie Elliott and new manager Chris Heath although the club was missing five key regulars.

Chrysler-Dodge broke a scoreless tie with two unanswered goals in the second period. The club upped its lead to 3-0 early in the third period before Miltonwe finally got its together.

Miltonwe battled back and tied the score with three straight goals. But less than a minute after Miltonwe tied the score, Rota, Haggart and Delnin completed a picture-perfect play with Delnin poking it home to win the game. Chrysler added an insurance goal with just over a minute left.

Rota opened the scoring for MCD three minutes into the first period when he scored from Haggart. Three minutes later, Warren Selch, who was traded from Miltonwe to Chrysler before the season, made it 2-0 with a goal from Marty Farrell.

Haggart, arguably the best player on the ice all night, made it 3-0 with an unassisted goal early in the final frame.

At that point, Miltonwe awakened and less than three minutes later, Ernie McConnell poked home a goal from Duane Stark. Keith Michie made it 2-0 when he scored from a scramble in front of MCD netminder Don Bell, another Miltonwe castaway. Earl Shepherd and Bob Baker earned assists.

Miltonwe completed its comeback with four minutes left in the period. McConnell set up Stark with a perfect pass from inside the Miltonwe zone to Stark at centre ice. The right-winger made no mistake flipping home a wrist shot from about 10 feet out.

However, MCD struck back within a minute as Delnin converted a nice play and then with both teams playing a man short, Steve Wilson drove home a goal from Haggart (his fourth point of the game) and Tim Smelko (another former Miltonwe player).

Bell played well in goal for MCD for the second week in succession, and along with Haggart, were among those who could have been selected player of the week.

The Racer's Edge showed a lot of determination in rallying from a pair of three-goal disadvantages to earn the draw with Straight Line.

Fencers had dominated the early going and appeared to have the game well in hand. The teams played even at 2-2 after one period before Straight Line jumped ahead 5-2 with three unanswered goals in the second period.

Penalties played a major factor in the third period as Straight Line picked up five minors to two for The Edge.

Buddy Thomas closed the gap to 5-3 midway through the third period with a nice goal from Dean Villa. With three minutes to go, Bill Lyons scored his second of the night from Randy

McDonald and Norm Kerwin for what appeared to be the insurance goal at 6-3.

However, with 1:22 to go, Villa popped home a goal from Tom Chuchmach and Thomas. On the play, Straight Line's Randy Murray picked up a slashing penalty. Just 21 seconds later, Mike Murray scored the prettiest goal of the game when he converted an end-to-end rush to close The Edge to within a single tally.

Bedlam erupted with 24 seconds left on the clock when, with The Edge playing short-handed, Chuchmach scored from Thomas and Pete McCuaig to earn the draw.

Thomas paced The Edge with a goal and three assists. Villa pumped home a goal and added two assists while George Trencs, Murray, Chuchmach and McCuaig added single goals.

Ian Wanless and Bill Lyons paced Straight Line with two goals apiece while Steve Hannon

and Don Habkirk added singles. Norm Kerwin led the assist-makers with three while Rob Champoux and Randy McDonald added two assists each.

In the opening game of the night, JB Stable rallied with single goals in each period to score the win over Lou's Place. The victory restored JB Stable's grip on first place, a point ahead of Hawks.

The story of the game was the goalkeeping of Phil Bailey who received Molson's player-of-the-week honors.

It took JB Stable just three minutes to break the scoreless deadlock when Dave Heipel scored from Jay Norland.

Norland made it 2-0 three minutes into the second period when Richard Shannon scored with assists to John Leiprich and Jim Cartwright.

However, Todd Corradetti restored the two-goal margin with five minutes to go scoring from

Ron Armstrong and Paul Mountain.

Slashes—The wheeling and dealing of Miltonwe coach Dave Dermo is not over. After being foiled in several attempts to acquire Mike Murray from The Racer's Edge, Dermo completed a two-part deal which, in effect, trade goalie Glen Horney to The Edge in exchange for a second-round draft choice in next year's draft.

However, because of league rules, the trade needed to be completed in two parts. First, Dermo traded Len Coulson, who hasn't yet suited up this year, to The Edge for a second round pick. Then he turned around and traded Horney and got Coulson in return. Dermo will pick up Scott Watkins back out of the draft to act in a back-up capacity to Mike Shepherd, who will take over first-string status.

The trade will give The Edge both Horney brothers in goal, Glen and Al. Dave Ballard has retired through injury.

Orangeville flu bug sickens Optimists 6-4

Milton Optimists minor peewees were struck by a flu bug Saturday, known as the Orangeville flu, as the team fell victim to their second loss of the season, and second loss to Orangeville.

The hale and hardy Orangeville players, immune to this bug, showed their good health by scoring the only three goals of the first period.

Shawn Healey was the only Optimist unaffected by this "flu" and he put Milton on the board in the early minutes of the second period on an assist from Kyle Hasselfeldt. Healey continued to resist the Orangeville strain adding another two unassisted goals to tie the game up at the end of the second period.

Orangeville went ahead in the third period, but Healey came back again from an assist to Robbie Mifsud to score his fourth goal, but the bug struck. With no one left, Orangeville scored another two goals to take the game 6-4.

The Orangeville bug must have been the 24-hour variety because Sunday night Optimists recovered sufficiently to take an easy 8-0 win over Oakville.

It took Healey seven seconds from

the opening face off to score. (The flu must have slowed him down a little.) Oakville put up a good battle until late in the period Healey scored his second goal on assist from Lee Finch and Turner, while Oakville was short-handed.

Oakville continued to hold Milton off, but halfway through the second period other members of the Optimist began to show that they had recuperate from Saturday as Milton notched up four goals in four minutes. Gregg Harris began the barrage on an assist from Healey. Mark French scored 20 seconds later unassisted, followed shortly after by a goal from Chris Fabbro, with French assisting. Healey finished up the barrage on a break away to give the team a 6-0 lead.

Healey opened the scoring early in the third period with assistance from Scott McLeod and Finch closed out their 8-0 win on assists from Turner and French. Goalie Mark Harrison fought off 15 shots to give him a shutout.

Saturday at 5:15 p.m. Optimists play Streetsville at Memorial Arena and usually have a paralyzing effect on this team.
