Advancing to the championship game of a tournament in Dundas over the weekend, Milton Fifth Wheel major bantams dropped the final by a 10-5 count to Humber Valley. Milton advanced to the final with a 2-1 win

over Hespeler and an overtime victory over Stoney Creek.

In the championship game, Humber Valley carried a slim 4-3 lead into the final frame before the roof fell in on the Wheelers. In the opener, Milton squeezed by Hespeler 2-1 with Steve Scannell and Del Papa scoring goals. Doug Beamish, Morgan, Cameron and Davidson picked up assists.

Set to film Sunday Local BMX racer to 'star' in CBC documentary

Overdrive Sports is quite proud of its bicycle moto-cross (BMX) racing team, thank you very much. But now, they're going to let the rest of the country in on their pride.

After several weeks of deliberation, the Canadian Broadcasting Company (CBC) has finalized the plans for a special half-hour documentary on BMX racing "starring" Milton's own Gary Francis. The initial plan calls for the program to be shown in the province in prime time. It may later be shown nation-wide.

The plan calls for the CBC to shoot the show Sunday at Newmarket through the eyes of a BMX racer. After searching through about a half-dozen clubs, CBC producer Raj Narrian,

chose Overdrive Sports for the basis of the documentary.

The CBC wanted a 12 or 13-year-old racer to "star" in the film and Overdrive coach Mike Hession chose Francis because of his dedication to the sport.

The aim of the program is to familiarize the Canadian public with the comparatively new sport of BMX racing. The sport has long-time roots in the United States but is just in its infancy in Canada.

At a meet at the International Centre in Toronto last month, Narrian went on a look-see basis curious in that rival network CTV was covering the event for its Wide World of Sports feature and that no one from any CBC station was attending.

Narrian was impressed with the events and searched out about six teams. After inquiries to all member clubs, Narrian chose the smallest of the lot, Overdrive, because of its excellent results and intentions to become stronger with a new track in the spring.

As a result of Narrian's inquisitiveness, a special race will be set up at a track in Newmarket. The race is sponsored by North Star shoes which will provide trophies and look after the track.

Overdrive Sports is responsible for organizing the competition and Hession and assistant Gary Morrison have been busy this week lining up opponents.

The program will centre on the 13-year-old Francis. It will concentrate on the conditioning, clothing, bike equipment, training, experience and goals of the bike riders.

The show will be seen through Francis' perspective. He will answer questions prior to the races which will then be filmed He will face much pressure to succeed during the events. It will also concentrate on the role of the team in BMX racing.

Further details of the showing of the program, as well as the club's meet in Toronto which was filmed by CTV, will be publicized in this paper as soon as they are made available.

MAC back with enthusiasm

Registration up as club ready for second year

One successful season deserves another. And with that in mind, swimming coach Carol Murray is tackling the second year of the Milton Aquatic Club with paralled enthusiasm which is being reflected in her students.

Last year, the club's first, was an unqualified success. Several swimmers improved dramatically over the season with some showing signs of great promise.

This year is no different. The registration numbers increased by more than 50 per cent and are approaching the maximum. Enrolment has been increased to 76 students from 47. The breakdown shows 28 in the advanced group, 23 in the intermediate group and 25 in the novice division. The new year will bring more meets and

tougher competition for her swimmers and for the first time, MAC will host its first meet. The meet goes all day Saturday Dec. 19 at E.C. Drury School and Mrs. Murray encourages all swimming enthusiasts to attend the meet.

Some swimmers last year improved to such a degree, that six were recruited by the Burlington club. The swimmers spent the summer in Burlington but all returned to Mrs. Murray's program where more personal contact will be available. Mrs. Murray is MAC's only coach and is directly involved with each swimmer.

"I enjoy the closeness of the smaller club,", says Mrs. Murray. "I aim to keep the club lowkey because being ticketted (by the Canadian Amateur Swimming Association) means you're always paying money for some CASA reason."

Mrs. Murray was active in the fall. At the town's expense, she took a national coaching program at York University and passed. It should come as no surprise. Mrs. Murray has been teaching quality swimming for, well, many

Among the changes in the program this year are more young swimmers and outfitted team swim uniforms which were purchased through money raised in the club's swim-a-thon last year.

The club lost just to __wimmers. Hugh Silk changed schools and now attends Ridley College where he has joined the swimming program. Christine Irwin also changed schools and discovered that training schedules and bus schedules left her little time for sleep.

Among the rewards Mrs. Murray says she finds in the program is the progression of the young swimmers.

"I'm getting quite a kick out of the five-and six-year olds. When some of them started, they couldn't swim a width. Now they're doing 8-10 lengths without any difficulty."

"The kids are all progressing well. For instance, Ian Ballantyne took a first in the backstroke at our last meet. He put a lot of work into it and it paid off. He had always been third. This time he came first."

Already the club dominated its first meet of the year in Hamilton and early indications are for the club to return with similar results when it travels to Acton Sunday for a meet.

Doug Riding isn't what one would call a prolific scorer. He says he can't even score in practice.

But the 18-year-old left-winger made his first two goals of the year count at important times notching the second and third goals of the game to provide Milton Steamers with a 3-2 win over Thornhill Thunderbirds Friday night at Memorial Arena.

The win boosted Milton's record to nine wins and 21 points in 18 games setting up an important home game with Burlington Cougars last night

(Tuesday) at Memorial Arena. "I can't even put the puck in the net in practice," admits Riding. "I'm not one of the guys known for putting the puck

in the net." Much of the reason for Riding's limited offensive capabilities was his minor hockey background. He played all minor hockey on defence and was shifted to the wing just this year. The club chiefly employs him in a defensive capacity. However, with the inquiry to Bill Lynch, coach Tom Martin has been

rotating wingers and Riding ended up with Bob Landry, who is known to have a good touch with the puck.


"I've still got defensive tendencies," he adds, "but Tom says once you get over the blue line, it's all offence. Even the defenceman must go on the attack."

Like most of his teammates, Riding has kind words for the Steamer coaching staff, despite being one of the players to sit out randomly selected games.

"Tom is the best coach I've ever had. He has a great knowledge. He's also very smart, understanding, fair and willing to help.

"I'm not unhappy having to sit out some games. You've got to expect that. This isn't minor hockey any more. Sometimes, you have to sit back and see what you've done wrong.

"Tom's been telling me a lot this year and Chris (assistant coach Chris Meloff) has been helping me out. They're both free with advice. They've probably brought me along the best of any coaches I've ever had."
