

# Big wins, close losses characterizes Medics

Milton Docs & Dents minor atoms recorded two wins and two losses during the past week to complete the first half of their 30 game Tri-County league schedule.

After a tough 4-3 defeat in Burlington last Monday, Medics rebounded with an impressive 4-2 victory against Georgetown the following evening and maintained their momentum on home-ice Saturday, exploding with an 8-2 win over Brampton. Milton was unable to muster the same scoring power on Sunday however as they dropped a 3-1 decision to Flamboro in a game marked by an overabundance of penalty calls.

In Burlington, the Medics were facing a 3-0 deficit midway through the contest before Glen McBryde tucked away Milton's first marker from close range on a pass from Jarret Blanchard and Russel McLean.

Burlington regained their three-goal lead late in the second period, but from then on it was the Milton squad that began applying the pressure. With 9:41 remaining, Todd Mulley made it 4-2 with assists going to David McDuffe and McBryde.

The locals kept up the hard work and pulled back to 4-3 with 2:53 remaining as Ian Ellis finished off a good offensive drive by Robbie Crowe and Mike Cox. Milton ended the game with an all out attack but despite their efforts, were unable to secure the equalizer.

Tuesday night in Georgetown, Medics seemed to pick up where they left off in Burlington with a series of forays into the home-team zone in the opening minutes of play and were rewarded at 3:48 when McLean sent McBryde on a right-wing breakaway to score with a low shot from 12 feet out.

Two minutes later, Georgetown evened the score with a screened shot from 15 feet that gave goalie Ryan Peddie no chance.

Milton soon regained the lead as Ellis collected a Mike Lee pass along the boards and fired home a high shot from the left wing with 27 seconds remaining in the period.

Milton continued to dominate in the middle frame and went further ahead when a good passing play from Cox and Ellis around the Georgetown goal gave Crowe the chance to notch the Medics third goal at 6:10.

Solid work by forwards McLean, Mulley and Blanchard combined with a series of superb saves by Peddie helped Milton withstand some intense Georgetown pressure early in the third. But with 1:34 remaining, the home team succeeded in narrowing the Medics lead to one goal. The final minute produced some tremendous end-to-end action but Milton put the game out of reach in the closing seconds when Crowe assisted by Cox, scored number four.

At Memorial Arena Saturday, the visiting Brampton squad dominated play in the early minutes but were kept off the score sheet by some fine saves by Peddie.

Right-winger Crowe tallied the Medic's first marker midway through the opening period,

knocking in a shot from Cox assisted by Ellis. Late in the period, Trevor Brandt scored Milton's second, assisted by Kevin Davidson after Damien Dubien's rush up the boards. Brampton scored just 19 seconds into the second frame to draw within one. Mulley then put on a terrific scoring display notching his first at the mid-point of the period, assisted by Lee. Mulley collected his second at 14:31 of the third period, again assisted by Lee. His third came only nine seconds later on a blistering shot from the left point unassisted to give him a true hat-trick.

Dubien then scored at the 14:11 mark assisted by Brandt to complete a three goal burst in just 20 seconds! Brampton's Denny Dolvac countered with his second of the day to make it 6-2. Cox put Milton further ahead with a fine unassisted goal following a fast break up the right wing. Defenceman McDuffe banged home fellow defenceman Davidson's pass to complete the scoring and give Milton the well-earned victory.

The following afternoon in Flamboro, Medics were unable to recover from an early 2-0 deficit and slipped 3-0 behind with 7:35 remaining. Milton's Brandt was outstanding on the right wing and his determination was rewarded in the last minute of play as he fired in Milton's late goal.

At the midway point of the season, Medics have compiled a record of 10 wins, 4 losses and a tie for 21 points in 15 games. The club has scored 48 goals and allowed 35 goals.

# Legion clicks with Welland
