This communication allows us to share information so that positive and consistent progress may be maintained as the students move from Kindergarten to Grade 13.

Each year, the staff of W.I. Dick provides evening programs to allow the parents of our new students to visit with the teachers and discuss school programs. This helps to dispell many fears and concerns which may be building up in parent's minds regarding their child's entry into the Middle School. The staff also invites the community to "Open Houses" when the public is able to view our school in operation.

Perhaps a very special way in which we communicate is through the help of Parent Volunteers. Volunteers give of their time very generously, assisting teachers to give extra attention to many students by drilling math facts, driving students to special events and keeping extra programs operating in the Resource Centre.




