

Boys stop Centennial

Stopping a string which lasted for 14 boys years, the volleyball team of Sam Sherratt School turned back Centennial School 15-7, 15-6 to claim the north Halton championship Friday night at E.C. Drury School.

The Jim Hall-coached club ran through the six-team tournament in fine style and knocked off another Georgetown school, Stewarttown, 15-8, 15-3 to reach the championship round.

The team now goes up against Eastview, of Oakville, and McMillan, from Burlington, for the Halton championship which goes Friday starting at 6 p.m. also at Drury School.

For 14 years, Centennial has held a hammerlock on the north Halton title and for nine of those years, it was Hall who coached the team. Since coming to Sherratt three years ago, Hall has built a formidable team which just recently finished 10th in a 60-team Barrie tournament.

On the girls' side, defending champion Centennial avoided a Sherratt sweep with a 15-7, 15-4 win over Sherratt in the title Sherratt had McKenzie-Smith, of Acton to reach the finals while Centennial was disposing of Stewarttown.

The boys' victory marks the first volleyball championship for the school in its threeyear existence.


