

"This can slow down a meet, embarrass the gymnast and even produce a little tension between the judge and coach. We thought therefore this year to introduce a pre-qualifying competition assessment to iron out some of their pro-

"It allowed the judges to assist rather than score. The judges were very helpful and produced written appraisals for each of the four events for all 40 gymnasts in attendance.

"But as this was a low key meet, it was a pity that more spectators from Milton didn't come out and watch and appreciate how this sport is developing in Milton.'

Barbara Wood, president of Milton Springers, commented, "E.C. Drury offers one of the best facilities in Ontario for gymnastics and for spectator viewing. With the local club becoming stronger, we are sure that we will be hosting more good quality meets in the future.

On Sunday, the Springer gymnasts will travel to Halton Hills to take part in the second leg of the assessment meet in Georgetown. This meet

will be for Tyro and Junior competitors. Competing from the Springers will be Adrianne Solda and Liz Ferni in Tyro B; Kerry Horn and Gail Eastwood in Tyro A; and Karen Herman and Susan James from Junior B.

Sherratt claims Halton volleyball title

Bouncing back with intensity, Sam Sherratt School captured the Halton elementary school boys volleyball championship with a straight-set victory over McMillan School of Burlington Friday night at E.C. Drury School.

Before about 400 supporters, Sherratt swept the Burlington school 15-13, 15-6 to claim its first Halton team title in its three-year history.

"Our guys have just never played better," explained Sherratt coach Jim Hall.

There was little doubt about that. McMillan handled Sherratt in two straight games in the preliminary round before meeting them again for

In the round-robin, McMillan took the first game 15-9. Sherratt had McMillan on the ropes in the second game with a 14-11 lead but the Milton school couldn't come up with the winner and watched as McMillan strung together five straight points for a 16-14 win.

Sherratt handled Eastview from Oakville 15-10 and 15-0 while McMillan also made short work of the Oakville school 15-6, 15-3.
