ponents with a fine showing in juvenile ladies for the top honors.

In pre-novice ladies, Colleen Thornton was third while Heidi Brooks also was third in intermediate ladies.

In other results, Kelli Stewart was second in senior bronze solo dance while Nancy McDonell was first in junior silver ladies solo dance.

Medics are in tough battle

In one of the more interesting series, Milton Docs & Dents minor atoms and Georgetown are tied up at three points apiece in their best-of-five OMHA zone qualifying series.

After Medics took the opener last week 3-2, Georgetown battled back to even the series with a 2-1 win last Tuesday in Georgetown.

A scene shift Saturday to Milton produced yet another close contest with neither prevailing in a 6-6 saw-off.

Two Georgetown goals in the last period were enough to eclipse the Medics' lone marker of the game scored late in the middle frame, and tie the series with a 2-1 Georgetown win.

The home team took the play to Milton on the opening face-off with such determination that the Medics were denied a single shot on goal in the opening period.

But for the outstanding goal-tending of Milton's Ryan Peddie, and solid penalty-killing by Jarrett Blanchard and Robbie Crowe in particular, Georgetown might well have held a comfortable lead going into the middle frame.

At 3:49 in the second, Medics turned the tables when defenceman David McDuffe fed a perfect rink-wide pass to Damien Dubien on the left wing. Dubien worked his way around the boards and laid the puck back in front for Crowe to pop it home.

Georgetown evened the score, two minutes into the final frame on a breakaway, then finally went 2-1 ahead at the 5:27 mark on a power-play, their fifth of the game to that point.

With the minor atom series tied at one game each, Georgetown and Milton returned to Memorial Arena, Saturday.

Milton opened the scoring at 7:32 of the first period on a goalmouth scramble with Dubien scoring, assisted by Trevor Brandt and Todd Mulley. Georgetown evened the score with 15 seconds remaining in the period.

At 8:09 of the second period, Milton's Michael Cox stickhandled his way into the Georgetown zone, deked the goalie and scored, with an assist going to Kevin Davidson. Georgetown again evened the score at 2-2, on a power play goal, with 39 seconds left in the period.

Ellis made it 3-2 Milton, at 12:15 of the third period, on an unassisted power-play goal with a high shot to the stick side, following an end-to-end rush. Mulley assisted by Dubien, gave Milton a 4-2 lead at 10:03, after

beating the goalie cleanly on a high hard shot to the glove side.

Georgetown then, once again, came back and capitalized on two power-play opportunities, scoring at 7:35 and tying it 4-4, at 4:16 with 2:20 remaining. Mulley scored again, assisted by Cox and Crowe, but Georgetown was not to be denied as they evened the score 5-5 with 3:22 left in regulation time.

The game then went into a 10-minute overtime and Milton carried the play. Medics made it 6-5 at 8:20 on Dubien's second goal, a hard shot from the slot, with assists going to Mulley and Michael Lee. Milton could not hang on though, as Georgetown's late period heroics continued, tying it with only 1:52 remaining.

Georgetown powers 1-0 lead over Optis

Georgetown put together a physical and potent attack to take a 4-1 win from Milton Optimist minor peewees in the opener of their best-of-three final series Monday night in Georgetown.

The victory gave Georgetown a 1-0 lead in the series.

In the high school division of the Maple Leaf Indoor Games, Dew did the 600 yard run in a record time of 1:14.5 to win the event. He is the first athlete in MDHS sports history to accomplish such a feat.

The race itself consisted of four separate heats with competitors racing against the clock for top times.
