



Alcan's plans urge pop cans

A plan to allow recyclable pop cans in Ontario has received qualified support from Halton Region.

Councillors voted last week to support "in principle" a change in provincial law which would allow soft drink cans to be made of aluminum rather than steel. The support came despite

objections from steel industry

spokesmen, who say such a change would mean the loss of up to 3,500 jobs in their plants. Studies by the Aluminum Company of Canada (Alcan) have concluded only 43 steel jobs would be lost by the switch,

compared to 1,100 which would be created in the recycling industry. If the required changes in provincial law are made to allow the use of aluminum cans, Alcan has promised to guaran-

tee a price of \$900 a ton for the material. Halton staff had recommended support of the plan because it would reduce the amount of garbage being directed toward. the region's landfill sites and

provide an economic boost to other recycling industries.

administrative officer, told guaranteed councillors the price being offered by Alcan was what made the proposal

attractive. "That price allows us to piggyback newsprint and ferrous metal and makes the whole thing worthwhile," he

Miller Councillor Russ (Halton Hills) urged support for the plan because it would reduce the amount of material going into regional garbage dumps.

Bylaw held

A regional bylaw banning newsprint in the garbage dumps has been deferred for another three months.

Regional councillors recently approved the extended deferral because of a low demand for recycled newsprint.

The ban was originally to go into effect April 1, 1982 but has been extended several times since then. The most recent action pushes the date to May 1,
