The occasion was a special one for members of the Milton District Hospital Foundation who received the official approval to proceed with plans for a \$15 million expansion to the local hospital.

Hospital expansion officially approved

Extending best wishes and a hope that he would be back in Milton within a year to see construction begin, the Honorable Larry Grossman, provincial minister of health, gave the official nod of approval to a \$15 million expansion plan for Milton District Hospital, Monday evening.

It was a moment long awaited by many, particularly those members of the Milton District Hospital Foundation who have worked hard for the past two years to get the project off the ground.

"I am quite delighted to be here today. "Most of my colleagues are in the position of telling hospitals that their budgets are frozen. Most of my colleagues are simply calling a freeze to all capital expansion,"
the minister told a gathering of Foundation members and the media.

"I am fortunate to be the only health minister to go to projects such as this help

kick it off," he said.

His ministry has pledged to cover twothirds of the cost, or \$10 million.

Three million dollars will come from Halton Region, one million from the hospital's capital expansion budget and the last million from public fundraising.

The expansion will primarily improve the hospital's overcrowded outpatient facilities-emergency, physiotherapy, laboratory and radiology departments.

It will also include a six-bed Intensive Care Unit, a thirty-bed Chronic Care Wing (ten of which are additional to the 20 existing chronic beds), a new pharmacy and upgrading of several areas of support services such as the incinerator, gas systems, emergency generator, communication and

fire safety systems. The official campaign kick-off is scheduled for August.

Crime ring 19 arrests

Following an intensive three month investigation that included under cover drug purchasing by narcotic agents, Halton Regional Police have cracked what they describe as a major drug trafficking and crime ring operating out of Milton and Port Colborne.

A total of 19 people, eight of whom have local addresses, have been arrested and charged with 51 of-

Two Milton juveniles, aged 14 and 15 years have also been charged with break and enter related offenses under the Juvenile Act.

Milton guide out Thursday

According to police who maintained surveillance on a number of the suspects, many of the drug customers included school age children 14 years and

Although police made their initial arrests April 14, there was no release of names or the exact nature of the charges, pending the arrests of additional suspects wanted in connection with related criminal activities, namely a series of break and enters in area homes and businesses.

This investigation has resulted in the recovery of approximately \$5,000 worth of stolen property, which included video tape recorders, electronic scales, a microwave oven, color television set and numerous pieces of jewellery.

An estimated \$10,000 worth of narcotics and restricted drugs were seized, including approximately two pounds of hashish, marijuana, hash oil, cocaine, L.S.D. and Psilocybin (magic mushrooms).

Three sawed-off shotguns were also seized and charges laid.

Staff Sergeant Boris Yacyshyn of the Halton drug unit, said the arrests and charges subsequent represented one of the largest drug busts in this area.

In addition to those charged, warrants have been issued for two more people.

It's taps for the Kelso Pool

The Kelso swimming pool will be dismantled and removed in the next few weeks, following a decision by the Halton Conservation Authority to close the pool.

The need for costly repairs and a declining use of the facility were listed as the main reasons for that decision.

The small wading pool will remain and Authority staff are looking at the

possibility of installing a water slide

and other water play activities. As a result of the removal of the pool, Kelso will no longer offer swimming lessons.

"There has been no real demand for the lessons," explained Sandy Bell, manager of the Conservation Areas Division.

He added the Authority has experienced difficulty in filling classes over the last three years.

The beach, on the other hand, has proven to be increasingly popular, attacting droves of visitors from as far away as Toronto on a nice, warm

weekend.

According to Authority staff, repairs necessary to the pool apron and seams, would cost about \$23,000. The cost of removing the concrete pool will be between \$13,000 and

"We are trying to bring down the

cost of removing the pool," said Mr. Bell.

"If we can get fill at a reasonable cost, we will be able to do it for \$12,000 or \$13,000.'

Mr. Bell said staff members did consider other alternatives for the pool area such as a playground or sunken garden but they felt these activities would not generate suffi-
