MFL will be competitive

After flirting with expansion for several years, the Milton Fastball League will enter the 1983 season with a trimmed roster of four clubs.

Action began last night (Tuesday) in the league with just four of six clubs returning to do battle for the vaunted titles.

But it'll be a competitive four clubs. Unlike previous years, there are no weak sisters this time around. Each of the four teams, Thornborrow Petro-Canada Oilers, McDuffe Equipment, Remax-Miltowne Realty and Thruway Mufflers, boast strong starting line-ups. More importantly, each team has at least three strong pitchers which will ensure low and close scores throughout the year.

It was the competitive pitching of the MFL which, in effect, deterred Fifth Wheel and Lowville Cweco from returning to the

However, the league is set with games going every Tuesday and Thursday night at Brian Best Park with rainouts scheduled for Wednesdays. Game times remain the same at 7 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. each night.

To get followers of the league prepared for the upcoming year, The Champion has put together a small profile of each team.

Remax-Miltowne Realty

The most-changed team within the Milton Fastball League for 1983 is Remax-Miltowne Realty.

Last year, Miltowne finished in third place, just four games back of league-leading Thornborrow BP Oilers. However, the club has made several key changes with about half a dozen players coming over from the old Kilbride Merchants, of the Inter-City League to form a potent line-up for the new season.

Included among the Kilbride refugees is the new coach of the team, Randy Nykoruk. He played last year with Guelph, in the Inter-City League, and will be a playercoach with Miltowne this year.

Nykoruk makes up one-third of an all-Kilbride coaching trio. Dale Smith will assist Nykoruk in the coaching duties while Williard Rath will be the manager.

The team's strength is its pitching although Al Fenton, who for a couple of years has one of the league's top pitchers, has since moved to London.

Mark Curtis will return to the mound after an absence of two years. He'll be joined by Don Martin and Dave Yemm, returnees who give Miltowne the best one-two-three pitching punch in the league. All are hard throwers with a long reputation and knowledge of getting out batters in the league.

Defensively, the club shapes up with Mickey Bailey at first base. Bailey played last year with Burlington Cougars of the I-C League. Dave Gates, another ex-Kilbrider, and Nykoruk will also play some at first

The rest of the infield will have Russ Price (from Kilbride) at second base, Bob Baker from Fifth Wheel at shortstop, and returnee Dave Martin at third. Derrick Neelands from Oilers and Keith Michie will back up the infielders.

The club is well served behind the plate with Kevin Smith, from Fifth Wheel, returnee Larry Withnell, and assistant-coach Dale Smith. All are versatile and can play in the outfield where they will probably play when not behind the plate.

In the outfield will be Tony Ceelen in centre with Wayne Roskum and Wayne Riebot. However, the club has many players who can play any position so that the outfield in particular and the line-up in general, will probably change significantly from game to game.

So far, the club has lined up tournaments in Binbrook, Glen Williams and the Inter-City tourney as well as its own Hornby tourney. Unlike previous years, the club will play all its home games at Brian Best Park without playing any games in Hornby.

Prognosis: Superior pitching and strong well-rounded hitting should give Remax-Miltowne the top spot in the league. The biggest problem facing coach Nykoruk will be to keep each of the strong egos on the club satisfied as some will be benched each game. If Nykoruk can keep everybody happy, they'll take first place. If not, they'll be in with the pack. The betting line has them in first.

Thornborrow Oilers

Winners of four of the past five league championships and first-place finishers last year, Oilers have improved in several key areas and should give Remax a run for the money all the way.

However, several familiar faces are gone. Ray Tonelli left to play with Milton baseball Royals, Trevor Houston has joined a Hamilton league, Derrick Neelands has gone to Miltowne and Bill Brush and Roger Johnson have left to join the Milton Oldtimer X-Stars on a full-time basis.

In their places have been slotted Steve Gervais (an ex-Stag) and Len Jilliard from Miltowne, Doug Naylor from the baseball Royals, Ray Delegarde from Fifth Wheel, and Larry C. Scott.

Bruce Miller and Blackie Gaeton will handle all the coaching chores while Ed Dunn will manage the team.

The pitching remains the same with Al Few, Tony Broussard and Dunn coming back for another year. Dunn also said he is looking into the possibility in picking up




