Get more from GO

Milton wants upgraded GO Train service to match a 14.3 per cent increase in Go use from Milton in the past year.

The Milton line was the only part of the GO system to see an increase with passenger volumes falling off as much as 13 per cent on the Richmond Hill line.

According to GO's own statistics, 902,000 people travelled on the Milton GO line compared to 365,000 in the year previous, a major increase according to councillor Blanche Hinton.

She said the figures are far higher than the 200 passengers per day from Milton GO had first estimated.

Mayor Gord Krantz said GO is well aware already that the town wants increased services and facilities and the passenger counts underline the fact.

Calls down

The number of fire calls as of April 30 this year was down by 21 from the same period last year.

Fire Chief Jim Coulson noted Milton has had 113 fire calls as of April 30 of this year compared to 134 at the same time last year.

Two events

Milton council has formally approved a number of events to be held in Milton in coming weeks.

One of these events is the annual Optimist Club of Milton Graffiti Dance which will be held in the Milton Memorial Arena June 4.

Also on June 4 the Historical Automobile Society of Canada will be allowed to hold a parade of antique cars along Main St.

Ag Museum hosts display

Regionally acclaimed photographer, Arthur Kendrick, is having an exhibition of over forty of his prints at the Ontario Agricultural Museum.

The show, entitled 'Rural Relics', will include several of his prints from the National Archives of Canada Collection.

Mr. Kendrick employs special high contrast techniques to produce photographs with such amazing clarity that they appear more like etchings than photographs. These haunting prints of dilapidated barns, abandoned farmsteads, and derelict machinery document the disappearance of rural life as it was fifty to eighty years ago in such regions as Halton, Peel, Dufferin and Wellington.

The exhibition, which began on May 16th, is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and will run until the end of June.

Admission rates are Adults \$2.50, Students \$1.50, Children \$1. Seniors \$1.50 and a Family rate of \$6.

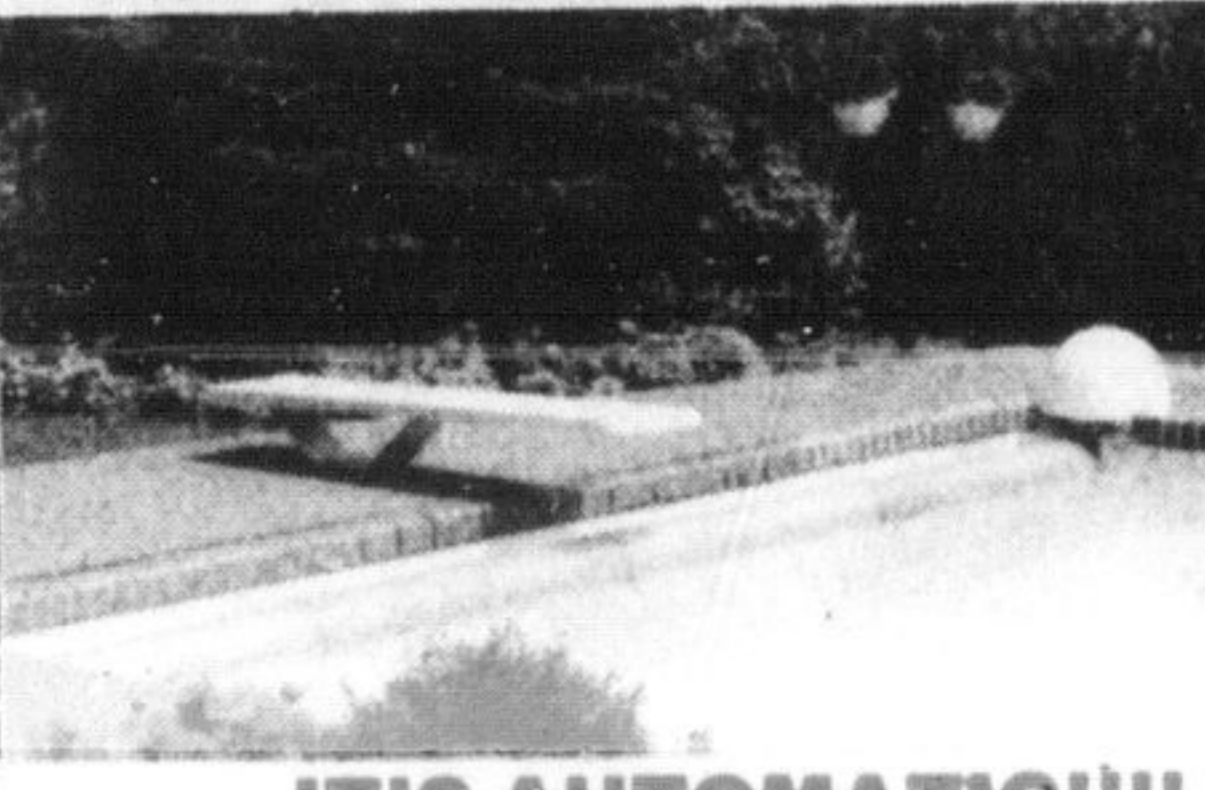

LANDFILL COMPONENT OF SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

YOU ARE INVITED TO A PUBLIC MEETING TO DISCUSS HALTON'S DISPOSAL SYSTEM FOR THE FUTURE

The consultants preparing the Regional Municipality of Halton's Landfill Component Environmental Assessment have presented the First Stage of their study Waste Needs and Systems Analysis to the Solid Waste Management Committee. The Committee received the report in draft form in April. The consultants have analyzed public comments on the Stage 1 Report and have submitted an Addendum along with a Final Work Program for the Overall Environmental Assessment.

The Solid Waste Management Committee will be considering the Final Stage 1 Report and Final Work Program, on April 6 at 1:30 p.m. and will be making recommendations to determine the direction of Halton's Solid Waste Management System for the next twenty years. The alternatives being considered include an Energy from Waste System, a Resource Recovery System, an Export System, and a Landfill System.

The Solid Waste Management Committee recommendations will be considered at a special meeting of the Planning and Public Works Committee on June 15 at 7:00 p.m.

The Planning and Public Works Committee recommendations will then be considered by Council on Wednesday, June 22 at 1:30 p.m.
