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
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Cup triumphs habit-forming

WHAT IS becoming a habit, Milton's John Tonelli participated once again in the major sports story of the 1980s.

The 26-year-old leftwinger with New York Islanders accomplished a feat which has been a dream in the hearts of millions of Canadian youngsters over the years when his club won their fourth straight Stanley Cup triumph two weeks back in a four-game sweep of Edmonton Oilers.

The Milton native, who now resides on Long Island, played another integral part in the systematic play of the Islanders. Although his honest effort went overlooked in his first few years, he is now regarded among the top handful of two-way players in the National Hockey League.

The four Stanley Cup rings have filled the fingers of one hand and he and his teammates go to work on the other hand next year when the club attempts to become one of the few to win five straight Cups. Considering all their jewelry, it'll be hard for them to keep their fingers crossed.

Tonelli was the last player to be drafted into the Ontario Hockey League out of Milton. At least he was until this past weekend when Rick Serafini went to the Toronto Marlies in the 16th round. Serafini actually was drafted out of North York Civics but he 'moved' during the year to the

Toronto area. Being drafted that late in the draft really doesn't mean a heck of a lot. Just the first halfdozen selections are really given a shot. But, just the same, it's something one can keep to themselves until they have kids. Not everyone can say they were drafted by Toronto Marlies.

One player who impressed observers of the Milton Steamers and Barrie Colts playoff round was Barrie's Shayne Corson. As expected, he went in the first round, seventh overall, to Brantford. He is expected to play in the OHL this year and pass up a shot at the American colleges.



Royals avenge in a big way

One thing about this 1983 edition of Milton Royals — they don't give up.

Backed by the outstanding hitting of Ray Tonelli, Milton Royals avenged an earlier defeat to arch-rival Campbellville Mohawks with an offence-laden 23-14 win Saturday afternoon (and early evening) at Brian Best Park.

It was by far the most impressive offensive show for Royals this year which in two earlier defeats encountered difficulty getting their offence in gear.

What was needed was a shot of revenge in the air as Royals surged ahead 9-4 after two innings. After Mohawks rallied to take a 14-9 lead in the top of the sixth, Royals rallied right back with an eightrun sixth inning and then capped the win with six more runs in the eighth to put the game out of reach.

Royals were led at the plate by Tonelli who connected for two three-run homers and a two-run double giving him eight RBIs for the day. Garry Naylor drove home five runs batting one spot ahead of Tonelli while Rick McTrach produced three runs from his lead-off position.

It was a pitchers' nightmare with each club going through four hurlers. The best pitching performance on the day came from Royals' Tom Sheppard who didn't allow a run in three and two-thirds innings in finishing the game to earn the win. He was preceeded to the mound by starter Albert Ouwendyk, Dave Turner and Roger Clement. Pitching for Mohawks were starter Bob Evans, Garney Mitchell, Charlie Currie and Ray 'Yukon' Evans who threw hard in finishing the

game. The pitchers gave out numerous free passes with Mohawks picking up 11 walks and Royals nine. The teams' defence on

the bumpy Brian Best field also took a beating with each club committing five

errors. The key to the Royals' win was in their comeback. The club scored four runs in the first inning and added five more in the second. Mohawks managed two runs in each of the first two innings to trail 9-4

after two. However, Mohawks rebounded with seven runs in the fifth and three more in the sixth to jump in front 14-9 appearing to take command of the game.

But Royals put together a wild eightrun sixth inning to take a lead they wouldn't relinquish. All the action happened with two out.

Glen Turner and Jack Cantelon started the inning with singles. After Naylor and Tonelli went out, Sheppard doubled home one run. Paul Elliott walked and John Turner followed by reaching first when Mohawk catcher Tim Roberts dropped the third strike. McTrach and Ken Armstrong kept the rally going with singles. Glen Turner walked but Cantelon and Naylor followed with RBI singles to complete the outburst.

Royals put it away in the eighth with six more runs. Glen Turner lifted a tworun homer before Tonelli followed with his second three-run blast of the afternoon.

Naylor led Royals with four hits while Tonelli, Armstrong, Cantelon and Glen Turner each added three hits to the club's 20-hit attack.

Mohawks scored their 14 runs on just 10 hits. Paul Ridley led the way with three while Currie added a couple. It marked Mohawks' second loss of the year.

Royals improved their record to 1-2

with the win. They play Thursday at Cawthra Park before playing a homeand-home series with Dundas this weekend. They're here at Brian Best
