Diversion program keeps records clear

By giving back to society, young Halton offenders can prevent themselves from get-

ting a criminal record. A new Juvenile Diversion Program under the auspices of the Community Resource Services of Halton allows young people under 16 who might otherwise be charged, or are charged, with an offence under the Juvenile Delinquent's Act, to sidestep possible criminal records.

They do it by repairing the damage or by paying the costs. They are sent out into the community to work in parks, put out chairs at the seniors' recreation centre, clean up church basements or help at special events.

second chance. They had broken the law and were automatically charged in adult courts. The juvenile-suddenly-turned-adult was often devastated, not realizing that their juvenile records were not destroyed on their

Double Benefit

Ms. Metrakos sees the programs as a double-barrelled benefit. The community gains from the work done and the young person often acquires a sense of responsibility and self-worth from a job well done.

Sometimes it acts as a springboard to a fuller, more satisfying life, as at least one young man from Acton discovered. The fine work he did within the program

gave him enough self-esteem to apply for, and get, a full-time job. Yet he was, at one time, considered a hopeless case, one everyone had given up on, said Ms. Metrakos. Typically, the young offender is male,

about 14 or 15 who comes from a broken home. He lives with a working mother and his siblings with no contact with his father. His mother provides adequately for her family while he has a part-time job, is in-

volved in some outside activities-often sports-and is average or above average at school. Then why does he commit offences? Usually, when asked, the youngster has no answer. Ms. Metrakos suspects that peer

pressure accounts for most of the motiva-"Maybe he's in it with other kids and he's the only one caught," she said. "Or maybe it's revenge. He feels he's been dealt a bad hand in his parents' separation, that he's guilty or responsible for it in some way. He looks at himself as being bad so he proves it to himself by going out and doing some-

thing wrong. She feels parents often take it for granted that their children are working through a separation in the same way they are, while in reality, children are left confused and

anxious on the sidelines. Whatever, the reason, most of the young offenders in the program are receiving good marks from the community. Seniors are

especially grateful for their help. Change support
