Fund jumps by \$205,000

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local branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, contributed \$7,000 on behalf of the organization.

The \$5,000 raised by this newspaper in The Canadian Champion Labatts Golf Tournament, held July 22, was officially turned over to the fund raising committee Saturday by reporter Jane Muller.

Eight Targets

Wearing two hats that evening was Mrs. Harrison, who presented a cheque for \$1,000 from the Festival of Countries committee. A \$100 donation was accepted from the Milton District Pipe Band whose members supplied the music for the initial ceremony and piped dignitaries into the dance.

Pledges totalling \$324,700 have been recognized by the fund raising committee which has been divided to cover eight target areas during the two-phase operational schedule.

So far the service clubs have shown great support. The anticipated donation from this segment of the community was pegged at

\$120,000, to be obtained by the end of September. In just one month these groups have given \$97,000.

Foundation grants, representing gifts and bequests, amount to \$100,000 to date. The general public has already contributed \$70,000 to their expected \$100,000 total to be reached by November.

The target for the commercial sector of \$30,000 has been dented by \$1,000 collected so far. The banks have pledged \$30,000 of the \$80,000 anticipated and industries have added \$30,000 to the total, a figure representing a quarter of their expected support.

Sports and other community events are expected to bring in another \$100,000 by the end of the campaign's first phase in November.

In the second phase, beginning in February and wrapping up in May 1984, a door-to-door public campaign and special grants are targeted to bring in \$100,000 each.

Foundation grants amounting to \$75,000 are predicted in the 1984 campaign.

No air conditioning at Manor

Residents felled by heat

A summer-long heat wave has caused no more than minor problems for most Miltonians, but for the residents of Halton Centennial Manor the problem has been much greater.

The 30-year-old building, operated as a home for the aged by Halton Region, is not air conditioned and temperatures of more than 80 degrees for several days have been causing problems for the elderly residents.

According to the wife of one Manor resident, fainting spells have been reported not only by residents, but by staff members as well.

The woman asked not to be identified because her husband requires more care than she can provide on her own and she fears retaliations.

"I get the impression the staff are doing the best they can, but some of these people are not that easy to handle," she said in a telephone interview.

"If some of them are fainting because of the heat, I don't think that's a situation we can live with as human beings," she said.

Despite the concerns of the woman, both the acting administrator of the Manor and the region's director of social services said they have not heard such complaints.

"We're doing the best we can with fans and open windows," said Debbie Oakley, director of social services for the region.

Nina Lowe, acting-administrator, said she has been informed of one fainting spell involving a staff member, but none involving residents.

"It's been quite a long hot summer and the effects do tend to be cumulative," she said, adding fans to ventilate rooms, screen doors in many areas and extra fluids for the residents are all being used to combat these effects.

"We try to keep the activity levels down and we know we have to be careful when the residents go outside," she said. "We try to

be very careful that way."

Miss Oakley noted the office section of the Manor is air conditioned but even those units are currently out of commission and are being replaced.

Since she has been in charge of the region's social service department Miss Oakley said there simply has not been enough money available to air condition the Manor.

A recommendation to provide such equipment could be made by the special committee looking into the needs of the elderly in

the region, she added.

"If they do decide to have the home airconditioned that would certainly be an important addition," she said. "These are some of the important and expensive things that I think are high priorities."

"We're making do the best we can right now," she added. "It isn't that I don't care, I just don't have the money to put air conditioning in there. It would be an enormous expense to put that in."

TV freebie planned Labor Day weekend

All cable subscribers in Halton who have converters will be treated to pay TV freebies this weekend and next.

What has been dubbed by the two pay TV networks as a "fall preview" will give those of the 11,008 customers of Halton Cable Systems who don't already buy Super Channel and First Choice, a chance to view them.

First Choice will be first to offer the freebie Labor Day weekend. Tune in channel 24 holiday Monday, Sept. 5 from 3 p.m. to 1 a.m. to see five different flicks.

The following weekend, beginning at 7 p.m. Sept. 9 until midnight Sunday, 20 movies will be presented on Super Channel. Cable subscribers must dial their converters to channel 22 to receive the free broadcast of non-stop movies.

Jim Magee, vice president and general manager of Halton Cable Systems said the company expects 30 per cent of cable subscribers in urban Halton will purchase the pay TV service within two years. There are

approximately 1,200 Halton residents currently receiving pay TV channels.

This figure shows an increase from the 900 subscribers in Halton when the new commercial free networks became available Feb. 1. Mr. Magee said 417 subscribers will be added in September.

The vice-president of the local company said the no-charge weekend movies were strictly a fall preview, dispelling rumors the move was to drum up buyers of the service.
